To a reporter yesterday he said he had placed his re signation in the hands of the premie some time ago: that Mr. Ross had conented to relieve him of his duties, and that he expected to be relieved within a few days. The resignation is dated October 12, in which Mr. Stratton states that he intimated to the premier some time ago his intention not to seek re-election at the close of the present parliamentary term, and felt it would be only justice to place the portfolio at the premier's disposal, so that he could at a time convenient to himself accept his resignation.
