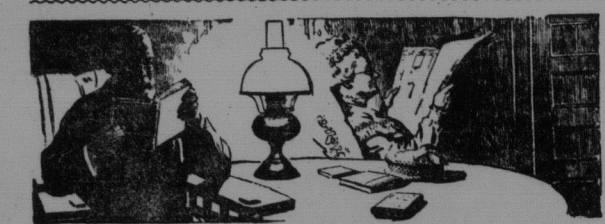

SUPREME COURT QUASHES
SUNDAY SELLING CASE

Several Other Cases Disposed of at Session of Supreme Court in Fredericton Yesterday.

Fredericton, Nov. 13.—Before the Supreme Court at Fredericton this morning the case of E. C. Washington, convicted for selling a lunch on the Sabbath, was quickly disposed of. City Clerk McCready said that in consequence of the decision rendered in "Upper Canada" and in "Kentucky" to the effect that the act under which conviction was made was unconstitutional, he would not oppose the quashing of the conviction. J. P. Winslow, who supported the setting aside of the magistrate's judgment, according to the law was not called. Rule absolute to quash.

The cases of the King vs. the Board of Assessors and City Treasurer of Fredericton ex parte Sheriff Timmins, was argued. County Secretary Bliss supported the appeal and for quashing the assessment, while City Clerk McCready showed cause against the order. Sheriff Howe's tax bill was \$13.85, and Timmins's \$31.25, and the appeal was taken on the ground that appellants were exempt from taxation as they were not residents of the city. Mr. McCready claimed that they were residents under the act giving them their appointment. Court considers.

The King vs. Gerow ex parte Amund Bros. in re Kincaid—Dr. Wallace showed cause against an order nisi to rescind an order discharging from arrest. W. H. Harrison contra. The county court appeal cases were then taken up.

Canadian Fairbanks Co. vs. Moore et al.—E. P. Raymond for defendants supported appeal from the St. John county court. Dr. Wallace contra. This case was still before the court on adjournment at noon.

NO FURTHER C. P. R. EMPLOYEES HAVE JOINED STRIKERS

No Movement Made at Toronto and Quebec and Men at Fort William Are Back at Work.

Montreal, Nov. 13.—Officials at the C. P. R. sheds state that no more men have gone out in sympathy with the strikers in Montreal, and that all the sheds were working full of men. Reports have reached the local C. P. R. offices to the effect that the men out at Fort William have returned to work, and also that no "bums" have been made at Toronto or Quebec.

PARDINAS HAD A WIDE REPUTATION AS AN ANARCHIST

Temple, Fla., Nov. 13.—Mantel Pardinas, assassin of Premier Canalejas of Spain, worked here several months last winter as a sign painter and decorator. Representatives of several foreign governments were warned at the time to watch him, as he was known to have anarchistic tendencies. Pardinas was from Havana.

Havana, Nov. 13.—Pardinas, the assassin is believed to be a man who formerly resided in Pena Pobre street, Havana. He was deported by the Cuban government as an anarchist this year.

ATTEMPT TO GAIN JOHNSON'S RELEASE IS AGAIN FAILURE

Chicago, Nov. 13.—Another attempt to procure the release from jail of Jack Johnson, the pugilist failed today. Federal Judge Carpenter declared a motion to reduce the \$30,000 bond under which the negro is held on a charge of violating the Mann Act. W. G. Anderson, counsel for Johnson, said he would then offer new securities later in the day.

SUDDEN DEATH OF
CIVIC OFFICIAL

William C. Dunham, Clerk in City Market, Passed Away Last Night—III but few Hours.

William C. Dunham, clerk of the city market, died suddenly at his home 55 Waterloo street shortly after midnight, and the news of his demise will be received as a shock by his very large circle of acquaintances.

Mr. Dunham was about the market yesterday as usual, attending to his duties and was apparently in excellent health. It was shortly after ten o'clock last evening that he was suddenly stricken down by apoplexy, and although medical aid was quickly summoned, he never recovered and he died shortly after midnight.

The deceased was 62 years of age and besides a wife, two daughters, Josephine and Marjorie residing at home, he leaves one brother, Frederick C., residing in the West End; Thomas F., of Waltham, and Sylvanus, of Boston, and one sister, Mrs. Davis, also of Boston.

The late Mr. Dunham for a number of years was in business before receiving the appointment as clerk of the market.

He was a member of the Orange Order and of the I. O. F. He was one of the best known residents of St. John, and his sudden death will be deeply regretted.

FIXES TRAFFIC RATES FOREIGN SHIPS MUST PAY THROUGH PANAMA CANAL

Prof. Johnston's defense of the \$120 rate for merchant vessels is based on several grounds. It reads in part as follows:

A toll of \$120 per net ton on loaded merchant vessels and a reduction of 40 per cent from the standard rate in the case of vessels in ballast will place the Panama Canal and its rivals, the Suez Canal, upon an equal competitive footing.

"The Panama Canal must compete with the Suez route for the commerce of the eastern seaboard of the United States, and of the Atlantic North Sea ports of Europe with the Orient east of Singapore. For voyages between the eastern ports of the United States and the Orient, fuel expenses via Suez will be less than via Panama, and with equal tolls at both ports, the Panama route will readily secure the traffic.

"It is not to be expected that much of the commerce of Europe with the Pacific seaboard of Asia can be diverted to Panama from its present route via Suez. Distances are less via Suez, and, with the exception of voyages from north Europe to Japan and return the fuel expenses are lower via Suez, with equal tolls at both ports.

"A Panama toll of \$120 per net ton will not unduly burden the commerce served by the canal. The cost of transportation between the two seaboard of the United States will be reduced several times the amount of the toll and for the commerce of the eastern seaboard of the United States with western South America and with Australia the economies affected by the Panama route between Japan and Europe are considerable. The toll suggested, likewise the saving in time and fuel expenses via Panama as compared with the Magellan route, between our eastern seaboard and New Zealand will be such as to insure the profitable use of the Panama Canal.

"Nor will a toll of \$120 per net ton seriously restrict the use of the canal by European countries. For the commerce of Europe with Chile and with New Zealand, the saving resulting from the shortening of the time of voyage via Panama, as compared with the Straits of Magellan, would warrant the payment of tolls of \$120 per net ton, or, in the case of the Panama Canal, but the fuel expenses via Panama will be so much less than via Magellan as to make the canal route preferable, even with tolls of \$120 per net ton. Moreover, the profitable trade route between Europe and Chile is via Panama and the ports intermediate between the Isthmus and Valparaiso. Panama is the natural entrance and exit for the west coast of South America trade.

Traffic Growing.

The normal growth of the traffic of the Panama Canal will not be interfered by a toll of \$120 per net ton. The tonnage of shipping using the Suez Canal has increased rapidly, the growth of traffic having been about seventy per cent during the past ten years, although the tolls at the opening of the decade were \$174 per net ton and in 1911 \$130, a higher rate than is recommended for Panama. It is suggested that the tolls at Panama start with a relatively low rate to encourage the Panama Canal to develop through the Panama Canal foreign trade.

In the President's proclamation the rate upon war vessels was fixed at 50 cents a displacement ton and Prof. Johnston had this comment to make: "The tolls upon merchant vessels should be fixed low enough to enable the Panama Canal effectively to promote the commerce of the United States and the world, but the United States government is not called upon to make the Panama Canal tolls upon warships low for the purpose of lightening the naval burden of foreign countries. In sending their warships through the Panama Canal foreign nations should pay tolls high enough to cover costs and risks incurred by the service rendered."

UNIONISTS PUTTING UP HARD FIGHT

Continued from page one.

"If the decision comes to Monday remains unrevoked," said the Premier, "or, on reconsideration is found to be the deliberate judgment of the house, it would be impossible for the government to proceed with the bill. There are two reasons for this. In the first place a mortal blow would have been struck."

Mr. Bonar Law—"Has been."

Mr. Asquith—"At the financial arrangements of the bill. Next, I strongly object to the passing of this House should receive upon all substantial and vital points, the assent of the majority of the House."

Mr. Asquith proceeded to point out that last week the government had a majority of 121 on a question similar to that raised by Sir Frederick Bannbury. He argued that there were precedents for the course pursued.

Mr. Law replied that the established rule of the House was a decision once on a resolution. The government's proposal, he declared, was an affront to the House.

Capt. Craig, Unionist for East Devon: "The government's supporters are under monstrous and degrading circumstances. A change in the government under the present international conditions if that is the ground for the government's clinging to office, will have the whole-hearted support of the Unionist party."

Sir Frederick Bannbury moved that a decision reached could not be reversed at the same session. "The only honorable alternative before the government," he said, "is resignation or dissolution."

"All the respect with which the members of the cabinet sit in the House, sitting opposite them grinning like apes. The government is only a puppet. The Unionist members can do so to home and make preparations to resist Home."

Lewis Harcourt, secretary of state for the colonies, attempted to speak. He was on his feet for several minutes. Every sentence was drowned by Unionist shouts and derisive cries for Lloyd George. He finally took his seat.

An Hour's Respite.

The attorney general, Sir Rufus Isaacs, had the same experience. Henry Page Croft, Unionist for Christ Church, shouted: "The name of this government stinks in the city of London," referring to various alleged financial scandals.

The Speaker finally adjourned the House for an hour. Immediately it reconvened, Sir Rufus Isaacs was on his feet and shouted: "Adjoin."

The voice of Sir Edward Carson, who led the anti-home rulers in Ulster arose above the din: "There will be no more business ever in the House," he cried.

The Speaker repeatedly appealed for order and at length declared: "I rule that a scene of grave disorder has arisen and I adjourn the House until tomorrow."

A yell of victory burst from the Unionists. The members of the cabinet clustered on their side of the clerk's table. No one moved to leave the House.

Prime Minister Struck.

On the Unionist side was a seething mob. An arm was raised and a document flew across the floor. It struck the prime minister on the shoulder. A shower of order papers flew among the group of ministers. Mr. Asquith white and indignant faced the attack with folded arms. At length the prime minister stalked to the door greeted with yells of defiance and approval.

Suddenly the Unionist member, Ronald McNeill, rushed to the clerk's table, and seizing a heavy volume, he hurled it at the First Lord of the Admiralty, Mr. Churchill, whom it struck full on the chest. There was an ugly rush from the Liberal benches, but the cooler members held back their colleagues.

For a moment a battle of fists seemed imminent. The peace-making voice of Will Crooks was raised in song, "Should Auld Acquaintance be Forgotten."

Others took up the refrain and gradually flowed into the lobby. At a cabinet meeting held later it was determined to adhere to the program.
