GREAT IMPROVEMENTS IN GAME LAW OF N. B.

Woodstock April 25.—G. W. Slipp, game warden, was in town on Saturday. He says the forests around here are in splendid condition. During the last season over 13,000,000 feet of merchantable lumber were cut within ten miles of Woodstock. The new game laws go in force on May 1st. Referring to the vast improvement made in recent years in the game laws, Mr. Slipp said that in 1896 the revenue from game licenses was only \$352, while the cost was \$1800. There was no surplus until 1902 when the government had \$1,000; in 1903 the surplus was \$8,000; last year the receipts were \$44,000 and the expenditure \$23,000.

The Mayor stands by his contention that the motion was lost and if he does not recede the motion may have to be formally passed later.

CONSERVATIVE CLUB FORMED IN SACKVILLE

(Sackville Post.) A meeting of the Conservative Association of the town and parish of Sackville was held recently to consider the matter of securing a club room, and organizing a Conservative club similar to the Conservative clubs in Moncton and St. John. In the absence of the chairman, W. W. Fawcett presided. A. H. McCurdy, chairman of the committee appointed at a subsequent meeting of the Association, reported that the committee had made every effort to secure a hall, but up to the present time had failed. Now, however, they had the promise of a hall being built at the recent session of the House of Commons. The plans were produced and the matter was discussed at some length. The sentiment of the meeting was unanimously in favor of securing such a hall and also favored the organization of a Conservative club. A resolution was finally passed empowering the committee to continue negotiations, with the object of securing the hall in the new building mentioned. The hall will be 55 feet long and about 26 feet wide, with two committee rooms. It will be finished with hard wood floors, well lighted and ventilated. The entrance will be from Bridge street. The association will take over the hall as soon as it is ready which will probably be the latter part of the summer. Wednesday evening before adjournment, F. B. Black, M.L.A., spoke of the work at the recent session of the Provincial Legislature, explaining quite fully the more important provisions of the new road act. It may be mentioned that an engineer of experience and training will tour the province looking after the roads. If the bill now before the House of Commons finally becomes law, this province will have \$50,000 to expend on the roads. To this amount the Local Government will add another \$30,000, so that during the present year there should be \$100,000 to expend upon the roads of New Brunswick, in addition to the regular grants which are made from year to year. Mr. Black pointed out that the idea was to have all the very bad places in the roads, such as the instance as the spot between Sackville and Dorchester, placed in first class condition. The work would be done under the direction of the engineer,

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole heir of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within at least 50 acres, on certain lands, a habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of six years from first homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and 50 acres extra cultivation. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of road, scrubby or stony land after report by Homestead Inspector on application for patent. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead certificate. Free.
