BANK CLERK SHOT IN MISTAKE FOR BURGLAR

Arthur B. Mertens Tried to Enter Seaforth Branch Bank Late at Night—Chums Shot Him by Mistake.

London, Ont., July 17.—Arthur B. Mertens, of Toronto, at the Dominion Bank at Seaforth, was mistaken for a burglar by his friends late last evening, and shot through the lungs.

A motor outside the bank had gone wrong and the staff occupying rooms in a building behind the bank were for someone trying to get into the bank and, taking the revolver, one of them shot Mertens as he was coming out, holding without turning on the lights.

James Gillies, aged 18, the bank clerk who apparently did the shooting, is in a highly nervous condition and hardly able to tell a connected story. It appears that Mertens saw the cellar door open and went into the basement to investigate. When he came out the noise he made aroused Gillies, sleeping above the bank, and he went down to see what was going on. Mertens is resting easily today but is as yet not out of danger.
