

### EYE-WITNESS OF MURDER OF ROYAL COULEE

#### Saw Bank Manager Pursue Bandit, and Later Found Victim Lying on Ash Heap.

Morden, Man., Mar. 19.—Evidence was given by eye-witnesses of sections of the Plum Coulee tragedy which were placed on the stand today by the crown prosecutor, W. J. Hastings, in the case against John Krachenko, charged with the murder of H. M. Arnold and with the robbery of the Bank of Montreal at Plum Coulee, said John Weib of Plum Coulee, said he had been on the point of entering the bank at the time of the crime and through the doorway had seen the back of a man who was facing Arnold. He could see Arnold with two hands above his head. Arnold said something which Weib did not understand but interpreted to mean that he was not wanted in the bank and accordingly went on down the street. He had proceeded but a few yards when he turned and saw a man wearing a dark overcoat dash out of the bank and walk very quickly around the corner, followed instantly by the banker. As the fugitive fled around the corner he noticed something like a revolver in his left hand. Witnesses turned towards the bank again and heard a shot. He crossed the road and saw Arnold lying on the ground. He and other men stepped over Arnold's prostrate form and stopped to gather up some money he had dropped in his flight. He then turned and ran to the automobile which awaited him about a block away.

J. D. Sutherland, counsel for Krachenko, cross examined Weib, but both cross examination and the preceding examination by Mr. Hastings were much delayed by the court interpreting the being unfamiliar with the peculiar dialect Weib used. Another interpreter was called in and experienced the same difficulty and finally Dr. McVay, a witness who will later appear, was sworn in as interpreter. In residence in Plum Coulee had familiarized him with dialects such as Weib's.

### INTERESTED IN TROUBLES OF PARILYS

Washington, March 19.—President Wilson today manifested his deep interest in the financial condition of the railroads of the country, expressing a desire to help in every legitimate way to bring them relief. The President had been asked by callers if he had heard any particular complaints from the railroads about their financial condition, and remarked he had heard what everybody was discussing, the uncertainty of their position. He let it be known that the government was giving consideration to the facts in the increase of operating expenses with the decrease in revenues. The President made it clear that the question of proposed increase in freight rates was "the big thing" in the situation, but did not express any opinion on the merits of the increase. No legislative action to afford relief to the railroads had been suggested to the President, according to his talks with callers.

The President did not point any particular way in which he could help the situation, though it is believed he intends to keep the Interstate Commerce Commission constantly informed about opinion throughout the country as it comes to him. Many letters sent to the White House about the pending rate increases already have been referred to the commission for the information they contained.

Two men were injured and two scores employees, including a number of young women, escaped from the blazing building. The property loss was estimated at \$100,000.

### WILL PROVIDE FOR CLOSE WATCH ON THE COLD STORAGE PLANTS

#### New Government Bill May Put Limit on Time for Keeping Goods in the Warehouse.

Ottawa, March 19.—At the opening of the house Hon. Dr. Roche introduced his bill to amend the Indian Act. One of its provisions is that Indians are not allowed to take part in outside dances, stampedes, etc., without the consent of their agent. Another sets forth that when an Indian withdraws from a treaty his wife is also automatically withdrawn. A third provision says that Indians must not sell, purchase or barter without consulting their agent. The bill was given first reading.

### FORCE OF GEORGES THE GREAT

#### Council of State Approves of Consistory Court's Decision Granting Annulment of Marriage of Prince William of Sweden and Wife.

Stockholm, Mar. 19.—The Council of State has approved the decision of the Consistory Court granting a divorce in the case of Prince William of Sweden and Princess Marie, who before her marriage was the Grand Duchess Marie Pavlovna of Russia, and he declared the marriage dissolved. In their petition for divorce incompatibility of temperament was given by both the Prince and Princess as the ground for their appeal. They requested a speedy decision.

### EXPORTS FOR LAST MONTH OVER TWENTY MILLIONS—SUBSTANTIAL GAIN IN DOMESTIC EXPORTS FOR ELEVEN MONTHS.

Ottawa, Ont., Mar. 19.—Despite the cry of hard times the returns of Canadian trade for the eleven months of the fiscal year ending February 28th show that Canada is in a very prosperous condition. The total Canadian trade for that period topped the billion mark, the exact figures being \$1,019,830,000. For the corresponding period of last fiscal year the total Canadian trade was \$982,511,000. This was the principal feature of the statement issued yesterday by the Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Customs. Exports of domestic goods for the eleven months of the present fiscal year were \$494,837,000 and the imports for the corresponding period were \$565,227,000. For the month of February just ended Canadian exports totaled \$29,854,000. Of this \$4,674,000 was manufactured goods compared with \$3,850,000 for February of last year. The exports of agricultural products were \$5,968,000 compared with \$7,545,000 for the month of February 1913. Animals and their produce exports for February totalled \$3,700,000 compared with \$2,861,000 for February 1913. Domestic exports for the eleven months of 1913 were \$320,897,000 compared with \$304,837,000 for that term of present fiscal year which is a very substantial increase.

### MODERATOR OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN ENGLAND.

London, March 20.—In consequence of Principal Skinner's inability to accept the moderatorship of the Presbyterian church of England the Rev. James R. Gellies, of Hampstead has been nominated. Mr. Gellies is an effective public speaker and has occupied a leading position in the ministry of the metropolis for some years.
