**HARBOR SURVEY  
MATTER WAS NOT  
BROUGHT UP**

Com. Russell Holds Motion  
Over—Question of Relief  
for Ontario Fire Sufferers  
Goes to Committee.

A short session of the City Council  
was held yesterday, only two items of  
business being considered. It was de-  
cided to grant a renewal lease to Geo.  
Dick for three years of the property  
now occupied by him. A telegram  
from Toronto in regard to the city sub-  
scribing toward the fund for the relief  
of sufferers in the recent fire in north-  
ern Ontario, will be considered in com-  
mittee. His Worship the Mayor called  
the council to order at three o'clock,  
the commissioners all being present  
together with the common clerk.

The commissioner of Harbors, fer-  
ries and public lands recommended  
that a renewal lease issue to Geo.  
Dick of the wharf property and sheds,  
in Sydney ward (known as the Sydney  
Wharf property) now in his occupa-  
tion, for three years from the 1st day  
of May last at \$1,200 per annum, on  
the same terms and conditions as the  
present lease. Adopted.

Commissioner Fisher pointed out  
that this was a very cheap rental for  
this property as there was about 360  
feet of wharf suitable for docking pur-  
poses in addition to the sheds, but as  
the lease was for a short term and  
the city did not have to pay for im-  
provements if they took over the lease,  
he would not oppose it.

**Ontario Fire Relief.**

The following telegram was read by  
the common clerk:

"The Northern Ontario Fire Relief  
Commission, representing the Domini-  
on and Ontario governments, City of  
Toronto, Associated Boards of Trade,  
Toronto Board of Trade and Canadian  
Manufacturers' Association, has been  
formed at the request of the Ontario  
government to solicit and administer  
funds for the immediate relief of the  
fire sufferers in northern Ontario. It  
is estimated that \$400,000 will be  
needed to effect relief of the situa-  
tion which is serious. In view of the  
urgency of the need the commission  
will appreciate the earliest informa-  
tion of the amount your municipality  
will subscribe. Subscriptions payable  
to T. Bradshaw, commissioner of in-  
frastructure, treasurer of fund. Sub-  
scriptions have already been received  
of \$100,000 each from the Dominion  
and Ontario governments and \$25,000  
from the city of Toronto.

The commissioners all felt disposed to  
aid, but thought that more con-  
sideration should be given to the mat-  
ter.

Commissioner McEllan said the sub-  
ject should be viewed from two or  
three different angles, and while he  
was always disposed to help in mat-  
ters of this kind, he thought that there  
should be careful discussion before any  
definite action is taken. This was a  
numbering and making district and he  
felt that as the province of Ontario  
received the benefit from the develop-  
ment there that they should furnish  
the larger part of the relief fund. It  
was decided to take the matter up in  
committee.

Commissioner Russell announced  
that he would not bring up his resolu-  
tion in regard to the harbor survey un-  
til next Tuesday.

Council then adjourned.

No. 2 Construction Battalion, which  
was authorized by the government be-  
cause of the demand of the colored  
people that they be given a chance to  
show in a tangible way their loyalty  
to the British Empire and is to be re-
