## SCHOOL BOARD

### MONTHLY MEETING

New Chairman Warmly Wel-  
comed Last Evening—Motion  
to Purchase Jewish  
Synagogue for \$5,000—  
Other Business Transacted.

Dr. Emery, the new chairman, was  
warmly welcomed at a meeting of the  
School Board held last evening. This  
was an adjourned meeting and a  
number of matters of business were  
settled.

Trustees were present the new chair-  
man, Dr. Emery, M. Colby, George B.  
Day, E. R. W. Ingraham, Thomas  
Maggie, H. Colby Smith, J. D. P. Lewis,  
G. Herbert Green and Dr. Briggs.

Mr. Colby, as the senior member of  
the board, spoke a few words of cor-  
dial welcome to Dr. Emery on behalf  
of the members of the board. Dr.  
Emery in reply said he was much  
pleased with his reception by the  
members of the board. As a member  
of the medical profession he felt that  
the appointment was honoring and  
working of the board with interest  
and approached his duties with due  
humility.

R. T. Leavitt, secretary, explained  
that this was an adjourned meeting  
and read a communication from  
Frank X. Melligan, secretary of the  
position of superintendent of mechan-  
ics in the school. Mr. Melligan stated  
he was experienced in industrial  
buildings and so well qualified for  
the position. On motion this was re-  
ferred to the proper committee.

A letter was read from the Rotary  
Club, signed by Donald Hunt, secre-  
tary, stating that at a meeting of the  
club held on the 10th inst., a resolution  
was passed unanimously in favor  
of the use of the King Edward school  
as a community centre. It was  
moved by Trustee Day, seconded by  
Trustee Smith, that this communication  
be received and noted.

G. H. Green moved that the sum  
of \$50 be granted to the widow of the  
late janitor of the King Edward  
School. This position of janitor, Mr.  
Green, had not been filled. The  
Returned Soldiers' Commission had  
been approached and notified but only  
one application had been received and  
it was stated that the salary of \$70  
per month was not enough. The mat-  
ter was left in the hands of the vis-  
itors of the King Edward School.

Mr. Green also heard in regard  
to the purchasing of the Jewish syna-  
gogue. The secretary was asked to  
refer to the former motion on this  
question and the motion that autho-  
rity was given to make an offer of \$5,  
000 for the property. The property  
could be taken by expropriation or by  
inducement but he would make a  
motion that, after consultation with  
the solicitor, the board close with the  
owners for \$5,000. For the benefit of  
the members present it was explained  
that there was a lease of 99 years  
for broken windows, each year, and  
that it was planned to ask the com-  
mission to close up the street and the  
board would make a plan to purchase  
the ground of the enclosure. The Y. M. C.  
A. were the only other people having  
a strip of land, 40 feet wide and 100  
feet wide by 200 feet long and an  
arrangement would be made with  
them to carry out this plan.

Dr. Briggs asked if the need for  
a hall where the girls could have their  
recess, and said that it had been a  
girl's school. He stated that the  
girls' school had a playground where  
basketball could be played.

J. L. P. Lewis questioned whether  
the title for the property had been  
sought and he was answered that in-  
vestigations had been made. Mr. Lewis  
sympathized with Dr. Briggs' idea  
and said that no money should be spent  
at present. The motion that the building  
should be purchased for \$5,000 was moved  
by Mr. Green, seconded by Mr. Colby,  
and passed unanimously. The com-  
mittee, Dr. Briggs, G. H. Green and  
J. D. P. Lewis with the addition of  
the chairman, were asked to look after  
the purchase.

Dr. Briggs asked if a shooting  
gallery could be arranged for the  
Cadet Corps of the King Edward  
School. The High school had one and  
he thought it could be arranged in  
the King Edward. This was left to  
the school visitor and Dr. Briggs to  
see after.

Trustee Ingraham brought up the  
matter of the crowded condition of  
the West Side school, saying that  
the assembly hall in both the La  
Tour and King Albert were now being  
used for class rooms. Dr. Briggs cor-  
roborated this, saying that there were  
50 and 54 pupils in every room except  
grades 7 and 8.

H. Colby Smith said that he was  
one of the committee appointed to  
look over the situation and it was one  
which called for action. After dis-  
cussion Trustee Nagle moved and Mr.  
Smith seconded a motion that the  
visitor for the West Side schools, the  
chairman of the buildings committee  
and the chairman of the board look  
into the matter, negotiate for a site  
and report back to the board.

Mr. Green made an objection to  
the hearing of delegates at regular  
board meetings, suggesting that a special  
meeting should be called after  
two weeks' notice had been given.  
No action was taken on this.  
Mr. Nagle moved that \$250 should

## S. S. WAR FUNDY

### ON TRIAL TRIP

New Steamship Came up to  
All Expectations Yesterday  
—Given a Thorough Test  
in the Bay.

"A splendid boat, the best of her  
type in every way," was the verdict  
of those who were fortunate enough  
to be on board the S. S. War Fundy  
during her trial trip round the bay  
yesterday.

The War Fundy left the Reed Point  
wharf early in the morning, under  
charge of Captain Amos C. Pitter and  
pilot Penwick McKelvie. Among  
those on board were J. G. Horne, J.  
A. Grant and James G. Hebert, rep-  
resenting the builders; Mr. Rea, rep-  
resenting the Manning-Gibson Brothers,  
Cardiff, Wales, the owners; Charles  
E. Dalton, inspector of boilers for the  
Dominion government; George H.  
Dunlop, who installed the machinery;  
Captain W. B. Bennett, inspector of  
bulks; H. C. Schofield, E. A. Inches,  
electrical expert; also Messrs. McNab,  
Apleton and Lambert. Captain A. J.  
Macleary was on board to adjust the  
compasses. Mr. Chatterton was in  
charge for the interests of the build-  
ers, and the engine management was  
under the capable care of the chief  
and assistant engineers of the S. S.  
Montezuma, now lying at this port.

In her 24-mile trip along the bay the  
War Fundy was put to every possible  
test, and fully answered every de-  
mand. The wireless apparatus was  
used, messages received and sent.  
The lighting system thoroughly tested,  
the signal system was put through all  
kinds of tests. The vessel made good  
time, averaging around 10 knots an  
hour.

The only trouble experienced was  
a slight defect in her steering gear,  
caused probably from the fact that  
she was high out of the water and low  
in the stern, owing to the engine pos-  
itions. The difficulty was promptly  
remedied, however, and when the ves-  
sel steamed back after midnight it  
was an unanimous verdict that the  
War Fundy was the best vessel of  
her type that has been turned out by  
local shipyards.

The St. Vincent's Girls' School  
for coal for 1917-1918 \$200  
had cost in this school \$667. After  
consultation with other buildings with  
the same number of rooms this was  
found to be a reasonable request and  
was voted on motion of Mr. Nagle,  
seconded by G. H. Green.

The meeting then resolved itself  
into a teachers' committee at which  
it was granted that the increase in  
salary of the female teachers  
should be dated back to September,  
1918, instead of January, 1919, giving  
each teacher an extra \$40. This will  
have to be confirmed by the full  
board. Those in favor of this motion  
were Trustees Ingraham, Smith, Colby,  
Nagle, Agram, Trustees Day and  
Lewis.

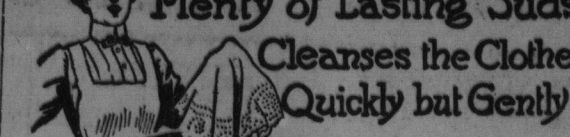
