

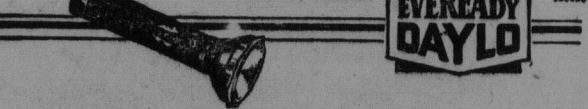

## MONTREAL DRUGGIST COMES OUT WITH THE FACTS ABOUT TANLAG

### COMMON COUNCIL MET IN COMMITTEE

Commissioner Jones Was Yesterday Authorized to Call for Tenders in Connection With Laying Water Mains.

At the committee meeting of the Common Council held yesterday morning Commissioner Jones was authorized to call for tenders for the excavation and backfill in connection with the laying of water mains in Douglas Avenue and City Road and to have a dump body fitted to the C. M. C. truck belonging to his department at a cost not to exceed \$400. Commissioner Thornton asked if it were necessary for soldiers to procure a second certificate for the final election and the common clerk will get the opinion of the city solicitor on the matter. He also made a plea for better accommodation in the polling booths as ladies did not care to enter many of those at present in use. The common clerk was instructed to forward to the Commercial Club the city's policy in regard to the establishment of new industries. A letter from W. H. Porter in regard to the line between the city and Lake Robertson was ordered filed.

### ANDREW FERGUSON WAS FOUND DEAD

Chief Clerk of Marine Navigation Company Was Found in His Office Yesterday Morning—An Inquest Will be Held.

Andrew Ferguson, chief clerk of the Marine Navigation Company was found dead in his office Prince William street yesterday morning by Mrs. Joseph Lewis, who resides in the same building. She found him beside one of the desks, resting on one bent knee and crunched against the desk with his head almost touching the floor. Life was extinct and the face was almost black, as though death had been caused by strangulation. It is supposed that death was caused by the respiration being shut off when his head pitched forward on his collar. Coroner H. A. Porter was notified and had the body removed to the General Public Hospital where there will be an autopsy. A jury viewed the remains last evening and an inquest will be held on Thursday.

### EARNEST ADDRESS BY REV. M. B. RYAN

Good Attendance at Coburg Christian Church Last Evening Listened Attentively to Clergyman from Calgary, Alta.

The Rev. M. B. Ryan, of Calgary, Alta., gave a very impressive address in the Coburg Christian church last evening. Taking as his subject, "The Man Jesus Christ," the speaker said that Jesus was not a myth, not a fiction, but a real historical personage as much as any man who ever lived.

While human, He was unique in character, other men have excellent qualities, but also defects of character; Jesus had no defects, and none of the failings of humanity. He was ideal in character. While human He was divine. He was "God manifest in the flesh."

That God should be so manifest was not possible but also probable, for it was thus that God satisfied the yearnings of humanity which reached out after the presence of God, and the bodily appearance of God.

## Police Court Cases Yesterday

Chinese Before the Court on Prohibition Charge—Prisoner Assisted to Sydney—Other Cases Dealt With.

All the cases dealt with in yesterday afternoon's session of the police court were those carried over from last week. Soo Hoo, the proprietor of the Shunshui Cafe, was before the court, charged with allowing his premises to be used for purposes contrary to the Prohibition Act. Inspector Merryfield called upon Detective Huddiscombe to give evidence. The detective said that he was in the cafe of the accused on the night the offence was alleged to have been committed, and that he saw a man in one of the stalls considerably the worse for liquor.

G. H. V. Belyea, who appeared for the defendant, recalled Inspector Merryfield, who gave evidence similar to that given by him when the case was last before the court. The case was then postponed for further hearing.

John D. O'Hanley, who had been detained for some time on a liquor charge, was allowed to go. Arrangements are being made through the "Ritchee Traveling Fund" to allow the young man to return to his home in Sydney.

In the morning court, Charles Ritchie, Thomas Connell and Albert Connell were charged with breaking and entering the summer home of L. R. Ross, Sandy Point Road, and stealing therefrom; also with attacking and robbing the caretaker, Neil Donovan. No evidence was taken, and the accused were remanded.

Clarence B. Whipple was charged with breaking and entering the house of James B. Kaye, West St. John. Evidence was given by Mr. Kaye and his son. The latter said he noticed the accused near the house shortly after the break was discovered.

William Kennedy and Jeremiah Wilson were fined \$58 for being drunk on Mill street, and for creating a disturbance.

William Lacey was charged with breaking and entering and setting fire to a grocery store on Germain street, belonging to his mother. Evidence was given by Sergeant Sullivan, who arrested the accused. As the accused is not mentally balanced he was taken back to the Provincial Hospital, where he had previously undergone treatment.

Further hearing was given the case of Frederick Foster, charged with breaking and entering a shop and stealing \$400 of dry goods, the property of Thomas French. Evidence was given by Detective Huddiscombe of recovery of a portion of the goods, and the case was allowed to stand over till Friday.

Four drunks were remanded.
