THE ST. JOHN EXHIBITION PROVES MOST SUCCESSFUL

Official Opening Saturday Afternoon by Lieut.-Gov. Pugsley—One of the Best Fairs in History of Association—Attendance Yesterday 21,350—Many Visitors to City.

The St. John Exhibition which is looked upon by many as the best ever put on in the eastern provinces has opened with a good start. The buildings are as attractive as paint, flags, streamers and other decorations can make it, and the thousands who have so far attended are fully pleased. The official opening was on Saturday afternoon when Lieut.-Governor Pugsley and other prominent speakers addressed the gathering. It was the opening day and although a very large attendance was not expected on this occasion there was 4,000 paid admissions.

The exhibition of 1914, or the last one held in St. John, opened on September 5th with the usual large attendance for the opening day. On Monday following the weather was dark and cloudy at first and then it rained in torrents, and the total paid admissions on that day were 13,000.

A Record Attendance. It was different yesterday for the weather man was kind, and a brighter holiday could not have been wished for. The sun shone brightly, the air was not hot, for the breeze from the bay caused the visitors from the warm inland districts to feel quite comfortable. The attendance in paid admissions yesterday was, however, more pleasing to the association as 21,350 persons passed through the turnstiles. The fair show was on in full blast and while there was many thousands present there was plenty of room for as quickly as the majority viewed the different exhibits they wended their way to the grounds, patronized freely the attractions on the midway, thronged the dance hall, and many thousands witnessed the vaudeville acts and the fireworks in front of the grandstand.

N. B. Natural Resources

That our native province is one of the richest in natural resources of all the wealthy provinces of the Dominion is a fact which all New Brunswickers accept as a matter of course. A visit to the exhibit of the natural resources of New Brunswick, which is being shown at the St. John Exhibition brings this fact home in a striking manner.

Just what the province has to offer, and what form of habitation, of herds, are placed before the spectator in such a well ordered group that after a tour of the large and interesting exhibit, he just naturally hunches up his shoulders, throws up his chin, and walks away proud of the fact that he hails from that little province down by the sea—our own New Brunswick.

Animals and Woods. The first exhibit of the province, the mink, fox, otter, raccoon, muskrat and others are shown with moose, deer and caribou, and all with a background of the native evergreens of the province, the effect obtained is a natural setting of great beauty.

The birds of New Brunswick form one of the big points of interest, and the Natural History Society's collection is the most complete one in existence.

In a series of glass cases may be seen the minerals of the province, the several varieties of deep sea fish, the grains, the moths, and the butter flies, all native of the province.

Official Visit Today

Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Pugsley and Premier and Mrs. Foster will make an official inspection at 4 o'clock (daylight time) this afternoon of the Child Welfare exhibit and the exhibits of the St. John Ambulance Association, the N. B. Red Cross Association and the Tuberculosis Association. The guard of honor will be composed of a troop of Boy Scouts and they will be received by Mayor Schofield, representing the Exhibition Association, Mrs. Kuhring, representing that portion of the exhibit dealing with public welfare, Colonel and Mrs. Murray McLaren representing the St. John Ambulance Association, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Likely, representing the Tuberculosis Association, Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Hayes, representing the N. B. Red Cross Association and Dr. and Mrs. Roberts, representing Child Welfare.

Opening On Saturday. The official opening of the Exhibition was held on Saturday afternoon at four o'clock, this ceremony being performed by Lieut. Governor Pugsley. The address was in the most part lengthy and towards the close a large number of those who had gathered round the stand had departed to other sections of the building to take in the sights, view the different booths and the attractions on the mid way.

The official opening took place at four o'clock on Saturday afternoon. His Honor Lieutenant Governor Pugsley declaring the fair open. Addresses were also given by Premier Foster, Hon. Mr. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Dr. Roberts, Minister of Public Health, Mrs. G. A. Kuhring and Mayor Schofield, who acted as chairman. A band concert given by the 62nd band was one of the enjoyable features of the afternoon. The band also gave a concert in the evening.
