Tulips.—A tulip, planted and reared in a box in front of a window at Haarlem, has been sold for fourteen thousand francs, or upwards of five hundred and fifty pounds sterling! The owner had sterling reason for naming it "My daughter's dowry." We are very sceptical on the subject of this paragraph; and if there be any truth in it, we suspect it ought to have been dated about a couple of centuries back, when the tulip mania of the Dutch was at its very zenith. The roots were the subject of speculation to an incredible amount, and were transferred from one to another like so much stock. Instances are on record of twelve acres of land having been given for a single root. Professor Beechmann relates that a single root of the species called the Viceroy was exchanged for the following articles: 2 lasts of wheat, 4 of rye, 4 fat oxen, 5 fat swine, 12 fat sheep, 2 hogheads of wine, 4 tons of beer, 2 tons of butter, 1000lb. cheese, a complete bed, a suit of clothes, and a silver beaker.
