OFFICIAL FIGURES SHOW THAT OF THESE 1,327,800 ARE DEAD.

Washington, Jan. 8.—Casualties in the French army, excluding colonial troops, up to November 1 were 4,762,800, according to official figures made public to-day by the French high commission to correct conflicting reports hitherto published.

Men killed in action or died of wounds numbered 1,028,000, and to this total must be added 290,000 listed as missing and given up for lost, making a total of 1,327,800. Three-fourths of the wounded have recovered either entirely or to such an extent as to be able to work again. The French Government estimates that the total number of unfit and pensioned men finally be between 800,000 and 900,000 men.

The losses among the native troops coming from French colonies or protectorates were 42,500 killed or died of wounds, with 15,000 missing and very probably dead.

George Geeler, a trackman on the C.P.R. at Hamilton while going over his beat was overtaken by a snowplow northbound on the Owen Sound section of here and instantly killed. Henry, Palmerston Avenue, was found on the return of the owner from a trip out of the city to have been entered and many articles of household value taken.

Wants Her Property Sold.

A sequel to the case of Miss Margaret Thompson London which caused a great deal of interest in the community a year and a half ago was brought to yesterday. Miss Thompson was entrusted with the care of an infant niece on the death of her sister Mrs. Williams ago. Two years ago the father of the child took action to remove her, and was granted custody of the little girl, Grace Jean Link by the court. Miss Thompson, however, refused to give up the child, or make known her whereabouts and for not carrying out the order of the court was imprisoned for some months and later was transferred to the insane asylum when it was discovered that the confinement had affected her mind. Now Link has instructed the Sheriff to sell Miss Thompson's cottage in the north end of London to recover the cost of his legal action, which was also granted him.

Accident at Guelph.

An accident occurred yesterday afternoon at the factory of the Modern Paper Box Co., Guelph on Waterloo Avenue in which Leonard West, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony West, 156 Inkerman Street Guelph lost a hand. He was feeding cardboard into a universal cutter and creaser, and when a piece of cardboard fell through the boy put down his left hand to get it and as he did so the press crushed his hand in a terrible manner. He was extricated as quickly as possible and rushed to the General Hospital, where the hand was amputated.

Milk Producers Lodge a Complaint. The milk producers of the Beachville district at their annual meeting passed a strong resolution to the Dominion Government protesting against the ban imposed on Canadian milk products being shipped out of the country. This prohibitive measure which has been in operation for some time, the farmers claim, has a most depressing effect on the market and particularly on the price. They point out that the prices on the American side was much higher on identical the same products which have not the advantages of Canadian quality and reputation.

Shot at Czech Premier

Basle, Jan. 9.—A despatch from Prague dated Wednesday says that an attempt has been made to assassinate Dr. Karl Kramarz, Premier of Czechoslovakia. Dr. Kramarz was talking with a painter in the corridor of the Pader Castle, when a youth fired at him behind his back. The bullet missed its mark, and the assassin fired again as Dr. Kramarz turned, but again the shot was ineffective, a portfolio carried by the Premier deflecting the bullet.

The youth was arrested. He gave his name as Alois Stasny, and his age as 18. He was born in Prague, and was employed as a clerk in a railway office. The youth said the plot to kill Dr. Kramarz was arranged at a meeting some days ago, but refused to go into details concerning it.
