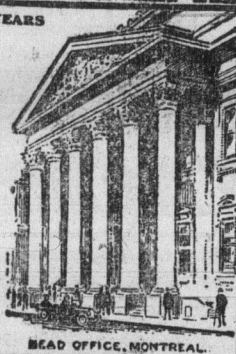

OTTAWA, March 2.—Parliament  
will conclude this week the debate  
on the address. A week of discus-  
sion on this subject, permitting as  
it does talk on everything and any-  
thing, furnishes a fair outlook for  
the session. It promises to be re-  
markably long because of the pro-  
fite of work that is presented. There  
is no prospect of it being lengthened  
because of party strife and the Op-

position of political powder.  
The Government fully intends to  
stick and its supporters show no

are ever arising, and the adjustment,

## The Death of Mr. Matthew Durrant

Family Was Among Pion-  
eers of the District

The late Matthew Durrant who  
died on the 28th of February 1919  
was the youngest son of the late  
John Durrant of Waterloo Township.  
The eldest brother John of Waterloo  
Ep. Henry of Iowa William of the  
same place, and James of Holstein  
County of Grey, together with three  
sisters Mrs. Larkin of Buffalo N.Y.,  
mother of the famous soap manufactur-  
er J.D. Larkin, Mrs. Donald, McKay  
of Winterbourne, and Susan a child  
at home and Emma unmarried, all  
predeceased the subject of this sketch.  
John Durrant Sr. emigrated from  
the County of Suffolk England, A.D.  
1831 to Guelph and he and his eldest  
son obtained employment in assisting  
in clearing the timber from off the road  
from Guelph to Kitchener. The parties  
thus engaged worked from the Waterloo  
end as well as to the Wellington end,  
and when they met, the Durrants got  
acquainted with the Waterloo people,  
which resulted in them coming to a small  
log house belonging to a Mr. Erb,  
west of Bridgeport a number of  
families including the Howlets, the  
Woolners, the Hamblins, the Godbolls  
and others were included in this batch  
in Waterloo Twp. In 1832 the cholera  
of emigrants, the most of whom located  
plague broke out with irrepressible  
virulence, usually proving fatal in a  
few hours, and the Durrants to try  
and escape from its ravages, from which  
their friends were experiencing terrible  
results, moved to the old Burkholder  
property between Bloomingdale and  
New Germany adjoining the farm of  
the late Jacob Shantz, by whose fru-  
gality they were enabled to buy a  
lot of this article was born, lived and died.  
The deceased was of a quiet unassuming  
disposition, sober, habits, indus-  
trious and kind, a good neighbour and  
generally respected. He was a Uni-  
onist in politics a Methodist in reli-  
gion, held a certificate of Life Member-  
ship from the Upper Canada Bible  
Society, took an active interest in the  
Cause of Education, was a strong pro-  
moter of the scheme to establish the  
new Union School No. 28 and con-  
tributed the lot for that purpose  
gratis his cool practical judgement  
will be missed in the locality in which  
he lived as well as in his home. He  
would have been 82 years had he lived  
until the 11th of August next.
