## Second annual faculty of Arts dinner held

About 60 students and faculty members gathered together last Wednesday evening for the second annual UNB Faculty of Arts dinner in

honour of students on the dean's list.

New Brunswick's minister of intergovernmental affairs, Aldea Landry, gave an inspiring message emphasizing the unquestionable value of a liberal education in today's

"Technical literacy is not everything," Mrs. Landry stressed. "What life is all about is in the arts; the shortest route to a career is not

always the right approach."

"In this society of rapid change, we have to prepare ourselves for career changes," she continued. "An Arts degree creates broadmindedness and exposure, and is the best foundation for a well-rounded

"An Arts education enables the student to think critically, to see the larger picture of life, and most importantly, to communicate effectively both verbally and on paper," she said with conviction.

"The fact is that companies and firms, including IBM, are now seeking people with broader training, and most of today's successful managers have a background in arts," Mrs. Landry assured. "We are approaching the turn of a new century and require innovative vision to meet the demands of a growing economy. The challenge of the future is yours," said Mrs. Landry.

In concluding, Aldea Landry encouraged students to accept the challenges of New Brunswick and open their eyes to what this province has to offer. "We may be small, but we stand tall." Mrs. Landry supported this statement saying that New Brunswick led the nation in capital investment in the last year. "We have a pride that makes New Brunswick what it is."

Following an opening speech by Dean Kent, toasts to the students were made by Dr.

Saad Elkhadem, chairman of the German department, and in turn to the university by Lydon Campbell. In her response to the students' toast, Kitty Bourne remarked that few students take a university education for granted. She spoke on behalf of the students in her expression of appreciation for the event.

President James Downey gave the response to Dr. Elkhadem's toast. He spoke of the importance of giving public recognition to students on the dean's list, as it sets higher standards and goals for other students.

The evening was enhanced by a selection from Lisa Gregoire, accompanied on the guitar by Steve Patterson.


estimates about \$30.000 to \$35.000, Renaud plans to have the movies continue on campus, bring in a few more guest speakers, and possibly another Aitken concert.
