Dear Colonel Price:

It was indeed kind of you to write me in the terms of your letter of the 29th. The session, as you can realize, has been so uncertain from day to day, that while it added to the interest it added equally to the responsibility and burden of leading a Party. However, no Leader could have had more loyal and consistent support than the Conservative Leader during the present session.

We are now doing our best to get the House prorogued, and immediately thereafter it will be necessary
to form a permanent Cabinet. Mr. King has not been acting very well, and left things in a rather chantle conditions necessitating a temporary Covernment without portfolio. We have since had two votes which would have been
direct confidence in the present administration, and on
each one the Progressives have voted against Mr. King.
