

of Italy and the dangers that it entails. We Italo-Canadians will not cherish any ill will against the Honourable Mackenzie King who certainly cannot ignore the formidable influence of English and anti-Facist propaganda that is at work unchallenged in this country. He has indeed rendered a great service to our cause by giving such publicity to the protest against the application of sanctions in Canada.

Although the Canadian press, which now is revealed as completely in the service of the English and Masonic interests in this country, had tried to play down the anti-sanctions and anti-League speech of Sunday last, now the great Canadian public has learned that someone has raised his voice in this country against the iniquity of sanctions and begins, perhaps for the first time, to ask itself seriously if Canada would not do better to free itself from its obligations towards the Genevan League and strike out for a purely North American policy, for example, by participating in this Pan-American Conference that has just been convoked by President Roosevelt.

He has tried to break the chains of propaganda of the interests who control the press and the clubs in this country in order to keep the Canadian public in ignorance of the true object of the Genevan League, hidden behind a humanitarian and
