# FLOODS IN NEW YORK.

FIVE FEET OF WATER IN SOME OF THE STREETS.

Children Had to be Taken to School in Row Boats-Number Houses Damaged.

New York, June 30 .- New York and vicinity were flooded yesterday by a downpour of rain during which about half as much water fell as in the prolonged period of wet weather this month. The storm was accompanied by thunder and lightning, and several by thunder and lightning, and several conspicuous spots were struck by bolts. Streets in various sections of Greater New York were inundated, and it is expected the damage by water will be great. The flood was most serious along the shore front, on South and West streets, in Manhattan, and in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn, where much damage was done by floods twelve years ago. For a good portion of the day here, the water in some of the streets was four and five feet deep, and many families were held prisoners in their homes. A novel sight was that of children going to school in rowboats.

The flood extended to the foot of Broadway, where the ferry houses of the Brooklyn Ferry Company were flooded. This was due to the rush of water descending the decline from

flooded. In s was due to the rush of water descending the decline from Bedford avenue. It poured down that thoroughfare fully a foot deep and whirled into the ferry houses, making it impossible for passengers to gain the boats for over an hour. One of the houses along Harrison avenue, where houses along Harrison avenue, where the flood was greatest, became so badly undermined by the rush of the water that it sank several feet below the level of the street, and the occupants had to run for their lives. Several other houses will have to be vacated because of the washing of the foundations.
