#### MR. WHITNEY'S PROPOSAL

In making arrangements for the payment of the overdue wages at the Soo, the Ontario Government has adopted the suggestion made by Mr. Whitney in an interview printed on Monday last. The leader of the Opposition, referring to the Premier's announcement that the land grant to the Algoma Central would be withheld by the Government until the wages of the workmen were paid, then stated that he feared this course of action would not help the men, and added : "I presume the Premier's desire is

to cope with the difficulty, but half ameasures will not do. If the law does not provide for the payment of the men by the Government under the circumstances, I am sure that public opinion and the Legislature as well would justify the setting apart of a portion of the land grant indicated for the payment of the workmen, and that they should be paid without delay. It may be that such a course would be exceptional, and that difficulties would arise, but in this case we should consider that difficulties are made to be overcome, and it would be a dark blot on the fair name of the Province if we allow the workmen to suffer, and perhaps starve, while we hold pro-perty out of which relief can be afforded them-relief which, by the way, will be in this case nothing but justice to which they are entitled."

# LOCAL LEGAL

At Osgoode Hall, before Cartwright Master, McDorald vs. Park.—Judgment (R) on motion by the defendants, for an order directing a change of venue in the action from Toronto to Chatham. The action is to set aside a will of the mother of the plaintiff and of some of the defendants, on the grounds that the testarix was unduely influenced by the defendant, Mrs. Park, her daughter, and establish a prior will more favorable to the plaintiff. The defendants reside in the State of Wisconsia, and it was clearly shown by the affidayit that all the witnesses who would have to be called for the plaintiff and defendants would under the circumstances be from Chatham who would have to be called for the plaintiff and defendants would under the circumstances be from Chatham or in the neighborhood. Held, that although the plaintiff is usually entitled to elect the place of trial when the right is exercised reasonably, yet in this case substantial ground had been shown to justify a change of venue because of the convenience to all parties concerned, and the advantage that a trial at Chatham would facilitate a determination of the issues involved, making it easier to have material evidence.
