## THE STREET SCHOOL.

It will well repay all Maple City parents to read the pointed interview in Saturday's Planet, suggesting a curfew bell for the children, and do a little thinking for themselves.

The Planet cannot say that it favors a civic curfew, but it would count it a privilege to encourage parents to deal firmly and effectively with flagrant existing conditions.

They are not exaggerated in the article. A walk around our streets any Saturday night between the hours of nine o'clock and midnight will convince the reader of that. Children, whose tender ages should emphatically entitle them to home restrictions at these hours, are parading around and getting into mischief and disgrace.

The Police Court annals have recently shown a deplorable increase in juvenile misdemeanors—and invariably the young miscreants have been children who were allowed to run the streets at night.

It is a serious matter—and parents should deal with it seriously.

## MR. WHITNEY'S PROPOSAL.

In making arrangements for the payment of the overdue wages at the Soo, the Ontario Government has adopted the suggestion made by Mr. Whitney in an interview printed on Monday last. The leader of the Opposition, referring to the Premier's announcement that the land grant to the Algoma Central would be withheld by the Government until the wages of the workmen were paid, then stated that he feared this course of action would not help the men, and added:

"I presume the Premier's desire is to cope with the difficulty, but half measures will not do. If the law does not provide for the payment of the men by the Government under the circumstances, I am sure that public opinion and the Legislature as well would justify the setting apart of a portion of the land grant indicated for the payment of the workmen, and that they should be paid without delay. It may be that such a course would be exceptional, and that difficulties would arise, but in this case we should consider that difficulties are made to be overcome, and it would be a dark blot on the fair name of the Province if we allow the workmen to suffer, and perhaps starve, while we hold property out of which relief can be afforded them—relief which, by the way, will be in this case nothing but the justice to which they are entitled."
