BUYING CHAFEE

What some men consider cheap in the way of feed stuff for stock is dear in the end. I have known men to feed corn to horses, hogs, cows, sheep and chickens because the mills were asking 30 cents per hundred, or 45¢ a ton, for bran or shorts. These men would pay 35 to 40 cents a bushel for corn and swear they would pay no miller such prices for mill feed.

These are the men that never make a practice of testing anything. It is useless to argue the point with them, for they are what we old school millers call bullheaded. When a practical man comes to the mill for bran and shorts he may not ask the price, but if he does, and thinks it is high, he will not go away without his feed. He knows he cannot well get along without it. Men of this class know the value of mill feed and understand that even if it is high priced it is cheaper than any other feed, and should be fed in part at least, to all kinds of live stock in order that the stock may be kept in healthy condition.

Some men will say it is all bosh about bran and shorts being more healthy than corn for live stock. Having been a miller for many years, I have made it a point to watch this point carefully, believing that there was much virtue in it and that it could be proven at would greatly help the miller in disposing of his offal.

I once milled in a section of country that was not very productive. The soil was old and thin, most of it having been under cultivation for years; besides, it was a hill country and much of the best soil had been washed off. Corn could not be raised very extensively on such land, and the mills had ready sale for their offal right at their doors. I have known the farmers to come fifteen or twenty miles for bran and shorts, the bran for their cows and the shorts for their hogs. In that locality we ran them separate on that account. With farmers who fed their hogs on shorts, cholera was unknown. Down on the river bottoms not many miles away, where the soil was very deep and rich, made so by that washing from the hills and settling over it, the farmers boasted of their great corn crops year after year. Corn was hauled out to the hogs by the wagonload and the farmers would laugh at you if you talked to them. This is where we would find the cholera slaying hogs by the hundreds. These farmers spent hundreds of dollars of expensive hog cholera cures, when they should have known that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

These conditions, which were so favorable to the feeding of mill feed, prompted me to follow up my observations. I now believe it is the best food for all kinds of stock. Fed to young stock it makes large bone and healthy development. With old stock it keeps the stomach sweet and healthy, aids digestion and keeps the skin clean and the hair soft and glossy. If fed with other foods it aids in their assimilation. This is a subject that should be taken up by the millers and worked for all there is in it. The more mill feed that is used the better the demand, and a better demand means better prices.—By Winfield, in "The American Miller."
