

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, excepting 8 and 20, which has not been home-steaded, or reserved to  $p \cdot y role owood lots for estitlers, or for other$ purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole headof a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of onequarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

#### BNTRY.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is attnate, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the interior, Ottawa, the Com-missioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is gitunte, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10,00 is charged for a homestead entry.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES.

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act and the amendments thereto, to perform the conditions connected therewith, under one of the following plans:-

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, it has father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to resi-dence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtain-ing patent may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead. (d) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. The term "vicinity" used above is meant to indicate the same town. township or an adjoining or cornering township. A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2), (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acress of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of slock, with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 300 acress substantially fenced. The privilege of a scooled acre is matriciad by law to those settlers

The privinger of a second entry is restricted by law to those sottlers only who completed the duths upon their first homesteads to entitle them to patent on or before the 2nd June, 1859. Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the bomestead law is liable to are his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry. APPLICATION FOR PATIENT

should be mc.ie at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent, or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent, the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, at Ottawa, of his intention to  $d^{\sigma}$  so.

### INFORMATION.

INFORMATION. Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the immigration office in Winnipeg or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoka or the North-West Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge, free of expense, advice and assistance in securing land to suit theme Full Information respecting the land timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Beit in Brilish Columbia, may be obtained upon applic-tion to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, the Dominion of Jimfigration, Winnipeg, Manttoha, or to any of the Dominion Land Agents in Manitoba or the North-West Territories.
