and rescuing them from the sufferings to which a vagrant and precarious mode of life necessarily subjects them. That there is no inherent inaptitude in the Indian for the cultivation of the soil, has been proved by the settlement of some of the Lower Canada Tribes; and I do not therefore despair of the introduction of a similar system into New Brunswick. I should wish you to bring the subject under the consideration of your Executive Council, and to consult also any other persons whose knowledge of the Indian character may entitle their opinions to weight, and if the result should convince you that any measure could be successfully adopted, you would have the goodness to report it to me, in order that I might consider whether it should be recommended to the Provincial Legislature.
