AT BOTTOM OF BAY OF QUINTE

Five Rochester persons lost their baggage and incidentally lost much of their zest for their vacation when a skiff filled with suitcases and other luggage sprang a leak and sank early Sunday morning in the Bay of Quinte. The steamer Casplan, leaving Charlotte Saturday night carried nineteen Rochesterians bound for a summer resort a short distance from Picton. At Picton the party were met by a motor boat.

The party being large only the women could be accommodated in the first boat and another boat was procured to carry the men. Attached to the women's boat was a skiff carrying twelve suitcases. A distance of eight miles was to be travelled in the smaller boats. When the motor boat had proceeded a mile or so the skiff sprang a leak and slowly sank.

"Wild excitement prevailed on the motorboat that carried the women," writes Mrs. Joseph S. Brethen to her husband, J. S. Brethen, of No. 466 Lyell avenue. "It was only with difficulty that some of the women were restrained from jumping into the bay to save their belongings."

Mrs. Brethen writes that the men's boat was travelling another course and that when the men heard the wild shouts they thought the women's boat was sinking. The men's boat was driven at full speed to the boat that was thought to be in distress and when it drew near dealt the sinking rowboat a death blow. The blow of the motor boat hit the smaller craft and hurled it to the bottom.

"This added to the excitement," writes Mrs. Brethen.

Miss Ethel Herschell, of No. 13 Lake View terrace, a member of the Brethen party, lost all her belongings. Of the twelve suitcases that went into the water seven were saved with great difficulty. In one of the cases that were lost is \$200. A diver may be employed to attempt to recover the money. Alexander Douglas of No. 21 Rosedale street, was one of the unfortunate. He lost his belongings including a new summer suit.

The Brethen party, made up of Mrs. Joseph S. Brethen and son and daughter, Milton and Gladys Brethen; Miss Ethel Herschell and Alexander Douglas, lost three suitcases. They estimate their loss at \$200.

Mr. Brethen yesterday scurried around the city getting new clothing to send to his family and friends.—Rochester Democrat and Chronicle.

E. W. H. Blake, B. A., barrister of Toronto, and R. O. McCulloch, of the firm of Goldie & McCulloch, safe manufacturers of Galt, Ont., have been elected directors of the Union Bank of Canada to replace the late E. E. A. DuVernet, K. C., Toronto, and late Hon. Senator S. Barker, K.C., of Hamilton.

Edward William Hume Blake, lawyer, is the eldest son of Hon. Edward and Mrs. Blake, and was born in Toronto, June 28, 1880. He was educated under Dr. Tassie Galt, at United College and at Toronto University. He married Miss Georgie Manning, daughter of the late Alexander Manning, formerly Mayor of Toronto, in 1890. He was a director of the National Horse Show Association in 1901, and has declined a nomination to Parliament. He is a member of various Toronto clubs.

Robert Osborne McCulloch, lawyer is the son of the late Hugh and Janet McCulloch, Galt Ontario. He is of Scottish origin, and was born in Galt April 1st, 1884. He was educated at Dr. Tassie's School and Toronto University, and received his B.A. degree in 1885. In October 1896 he married Miss Louise Leslie, Aberdeen, Scotland. He practices his legal profession in Galt. He is a member of the executive of the Canadian Manufacturers Association, director Galt Gas Light Co., Galt Art Metal Co., Mutual Life Assurance Co., secretary-treasurer Goldie & McCulloch Co., and chairman of the parks commission of Galt. ROAD TO ENLISTMENT HAS BEEN MADE EASY

Cancelling of "Wives Consent" Clause But One Move in Process To Get Men.

In connection with the announcement by Senator Loughheed of a new regulation which will make it unnecessary for men to secure the consent of their wives or parents before enlisting, it is interesting to note the general tendency of which this is an example.

When the war started there were many complaints that it was too hard to enlist in Canada. The increasing need for men is reflected in the various steps which have been taken to make enlistment easier. Many men were rejected on account of their teeth. Now anybody who has two or three sound teeth left can have fillings put in free and false teeth supplied for the mere cost of the material. Bad teeth need no longer prevent anybody from enlisting. Many were formerly rejected on account of various defects. Now the military authorities tell such men to have operations for these small defects, and the men are then accepted for service. If men are unable to pay for surgical treatment, the cost is deducted in small instalments from the pay they receive after enlistment.

Many were refused because they were under the height limit, which was 5 feet 5 inches at the beginning of the war. It was soon reduced to 5 feet 3 inches, and many young fellows who would formerly have been excluded were thereby allowed to enlist. A couple of weeks ago the standard was again reduced and it is now 5 feet 2 inches, although certain regiment prefer not to accept men of such low stature. The chest standard has also been relaxed in the case of young men who are expected to develop greater lung capacity at camp.

The new regulation which is to dispense with the necessity for the consent of wives and parents will remove practically every obstacle to enlistment except for those whose age or organic disability make them useless for service at the front.

The recruiting officer can now say: "Your King and Country need you and they need you so badly now that they will not let anything stand in your way except complete physical unfitness."

GERMANY'S CROP A FAILURE

This is Report of American Just Returned From Continent.

London, Aug. 12.—Germany's crop is a failure. Information to this effect was supplied by an American just returned from the Continent whose business requires him to be in constant touch with agricultural conditions in all belligerent countries. He declares that Germany's hopes of reaping a bumper crop this year are now completely dashed.

The long drought in May and June is responsible. It was of such a serious character that, despite the fact that German farming hands were planted last spring, the result now about to be reaped cannot even be called a fairly good crop. As it is, rye, barley, oats and corn are going to be harvested to far less extent than last year. Only the potato crop will be larger than usual.

GUNNER CHESTER WAS KILLED BY A SOUVENIR

Cananogue Man Was the Victim of a German Shell That He Had Picked up on the Field

Gunner William Chester, of Cananogue, whose death of wounds was reported a few days ago, died as a result of a souvenir-bunting craze. Chester carried a German shell into a trench with the idea of preserving it as a memento. He was ordered by an officer to throw it out, and while in the act of obeying this command the shell exploded, wounding him severely in the abdomen from the effects of which he died.

Sunday Fishing

Sunday fishing is becoming very prevalent, so much so that the game wardens have asked us to draw the attention of offenders to the fact that prosecutions will follow if the practice is persisted in. The game law of the Province makes Sunday a close season for all kinds of game. Hunting and shooting are unlawful. The penalty is from \$5 to \$500.—Bancroft Times.
