

PATRIOTIC SALE

On Saturday, Oct. 30, in the Town Hall, a most successful sale of cooked food, farm produce and general merchandise, was held under the auspices of the local Women's Canadian Club, and the sum of \$300 was realized. The day was fine, and buyers numerous. Lunch was served from 12 to 2, and tea in the afternoon. The members of the Club wish to thank all who so generously assisted them—the people of Waweig, Rock Road, Elmville, Bayville, Bocabec, Chamcook, St. Andrews, North, and Minster's Island for most liberal contributions of all kinds of farm produce; and the people of St. Andrews for their generous contributions of every description. The sale was not cancelled by contributions, but the Club extends its thanks to the friend on Deer Island who so kindly sent a barrel of beautiful apples.

Everyone was so willing to respond that the collectors felt that they were almost conferring a favor by asking. The thanks of the Club are also due to the gentlemen of the Town who so willingly gave their services and assisted in every way, by placing automobiles at the disposal of the collectors, attending to advertising, giving the use of the Town Hall and caring for the vegetables. Special thanks are due to those who attended to the sale of the farm produce, as they were tireless in their efforts and contributed largely to the success of the undertaking. To Mr. Chase and the electrician who provided the electric lights, and to each one who assisted them in any way, being too numerous to mention individually, the Women's Canadian Club extend, through THE BEACON, a hearty vote of thanks. It was hoped that a list of contributors could have been published, but it would be such a very long list that it is felt to be impossible. The proceeds of the sale will be given to the Patriotic Fund.

The October Term sitting of the Charlotte County Court was opened by Mr. Justice Carleton on Tuesday, the 26th ultimo, at 2 o'clock p. m.

The Petit Jurors were Alphonso B. O'Neill, John M. Stickney, Richard Keay, Randolph Langmaid, George B. Dow, William McElroy, Ross Mann, John C. O'Brien, Frank Clark, Bruce Love, Blair D. Goodill, Willcott Orr, William L. Libby, Albert Holt, Matthew McCollough, Herbert Erskine, Max Groom, Walter Greenlaw, and Hiram Greenlaw.

The only criminal case on the docket was The King vs. Louis P. McLaren; the charge being indecent assault. James G. Stevens represented the Attorney-General, and Dr. W. B. Wallace, of St. John, defended.

The Grand Jury, through its foreman, G. H. Stickney, presented the Court with a true bill in the case, and the accused, pleading guilty, was sentenced by the Judge to two years confinement in the Boys' Industrial Home at St. John.

The only civil case that came before the Court was laid over until the 23rd day of November, instant.

Mr. Hawthorne's crops suffered severely from a hail storm several years ago. Mr. Hawthorne is nearly eighty years of age, and feels his loss very keenly.

Orders within the Dominion and to the United States and Mexico, Great Britain and all parts of the British Empire, 10 per cent. or fraction thereof. In addition to the postage necessary, each letter must have affixed a one-cent Tax stamp. To other countries, 5 for the first ounce, and 3 cents for additional ounce. Letters to which special rate applies do not require the Tax stamp.

Cards one cent each to any address in Canada, United States and Mexico. Post cards must have a one-cent Stamp affixed, or a two-cent card used. Post cards two cents each, other countries. The two-cent cards require the "War Tax" stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals, to any address in Canada, United States and Mexico, one cent per four ounces.
