The Courier Said it Would be Twenty Three Mills.

And So It Is---The Council Met Last Night.

As announced in the Courier last night, the Brantford tax rate will be 23 mills on the dollar this year, a reduction of one mill from the rate of last year. The special meeting of the Council was a short, sharp affair, and the report of the estimates committee was adopted without objection and unanimously. It will cost Brantford \$472,579 to conduct civic affairs this year and pay all sinking fund and interest charges on debentures. The debenture debt has been increased by the \$10,000 Collegiate by-law, \$85,000 hospital by-law and the new Dufferin chool by-law. City Treasurer Bunnell pointed out that while there was an increase in revenue, the increase an increase in revenue, the increase in debenture debt and the increased expenditure for necessary public works rendered the situation a difficult one for the Council in making a reduction in the rate. In addition, there was an overdraft of \$11,000 from last year to be provided for. Street Railway Affairs:
