PEACE IS NOT OBJECT OF VISIT

Von Hollweg and Herr Jagow Both in Vienna.

Berlin, via London, June 29—Inquiries made in various diplomatic and official quarters tend to confirm the announcement made yesterday by The Frankfurter Zeitung, that the chief purpose of the visit of Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg and Foreign Minister Von Jagow to Vienna, is to discuss the Balkan situation. It is not known here whether Russia's offer of concessions to Roumania included the immediate cession of part of Bessarabia, but this is understood to have been a part of the Roumanian demands.

The trip of Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg and Herr Von Jagow coming upon the heels of the Austro-German victories in Galicia, caused rumors of impending peace negotiations but so far as can be learned this is not the object of their visit.

WITH QUIET COURAGE.

Paris June 29—Burgomaster Max of Brussels, interned in the German fortress at Glatz, is resigned to his fate, according to a letter written by him to the Havre correspondent of The Matin in which he says: "I take no merit for supporting my fate stoically. Besides I see in my patience only an application of the physical law that every being adapts himself to the conditions of life imposed upon him by circumstances. I have been shut up now 240 days and captivity has become a normal state for me. The sufferings I experienced during the first weeks following my arrest are lessening more and more."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$30.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$50.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reallocation in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
