REDS JINX SCHUPP.

Just as the Giants seem to have Grover Alexander's number, so, too, do the Reds seem to be able to hit Ferdinand Schupp freely almost any time he faces them. This slim, left-handed kid is a terror to most clubs, but the Reds have no fear of him. Last month Ferdie started a game only to have everything he offered to Matty's men knocked all over the lot. He lasted only an inning or two, but escaped being charged with a defeat because the Giants tied the score late in the game with George Smith pitching and lost out in the tenth, the collegian being charged with the loss of the contest.

Schupp's next appearance against the Reds was in the first game of last Thursday's double-header. In that game he went along smoothly through the ninth inning, but in the frame three hits and a base on balls off the kid pitcher, combined with two errors by the Giants, netted the Reds a run in the game.

Thriving for revenge, Schupp took a hand in the second game of Saturday's double bill after Fred Anderson had been removed in the second inning. Ferdie evidently is still thriving. He managed to retire the side in second—there was only one out and two men were on the bases when he went to the rescue with the spit-baller—but the next inning saw the last of Schuppie for the day. Three singles, a base on balls and a double gave the Reds four runs in the third, after which Ferdie made a hasty though dignified exit.

DOUGHERTY QUILTS

Pat Dougherty, former Hamilton pitcher now with San Francisco in the Pacific Coast League, is going to quit baseball this year, but he has strained his back in a recent game, and he is unable to pitch more than five innings. In a letter received by the Herald sports editor to-day, he says he is going to see Bonesseter Reese at Youngstown, Ohio.

Dougherty has not had much success in the Coast League because of his back. It has troubled him all year. As a matter of fact he suffered from a strain during his last year with the Hamilton's.

Toronto, July 20.—Manager Lajoie of the Leafs is still looking for a good right-handed twirler to round out his pitching staff. Now that Truesdale has been traded, the field looks as good as ever, while Altenberg will be back in the game in a day or so. Pitcher Schellenbach, of the Grays, would be helped, but he did not like to stay here, although the Providence club was willing to let Lajoie have him. Schellenbach came from the Pacific Coast League, and is the property of the Chicago Cubs, but he wants to go back to the Pacific Coast if he is to be released, as he does not like the weather in this part of the country.

The aftermath of Graham's run-in with the Leafs' manager has been charted in official quarters that first Baseman Graham has been fined \$100 and suspended. "Paddy" Lyons is now a free agent, for Manager Howley of the Royal has been instructed to release him outright. Lyons was lent to Montreal, and although he was not as successful as might have been expected, the Montreal management does not desire to carry him any longer. As there is not a place for him now with the Leafs, it was thought best not to ask him to remain in the local.

Alvin Smith, of the Grays, was badly split, and he will be out of the game for some time, while Mayer is still suffering from a wrenched back. He was with Providence early in the season, but was farmed out to Lawrence.

Alleging non-payment of part of the money due on \$100,000 bond issue the municipality of Port Coquitlam has entered action against Messrs. A. C. Front & Co. of Chicago.

The outdoor city employees of Nanaimo have petitioned the council for a 10 per cent. increase in wages and a stopping of work at 1 p.m. on Saturday with a full day's pay.

Pte. F. R. Mander, a former resident of Clayburn, senior stretcher-bearer for his battalion, a Western unit, has had conferred upon him the Military Medal for conspicuous bravery on the battlefield.

Government tug Point Hope crashed into the Esquimalt and Nanaimo bridge, partly destroying the bridge and its own smokestack.

The Anti-tuberculosis Society of British Columbia, with Dr. A. P. Procter, is making every effort to stamp out tuberculosis in the province.

West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon 20 acres of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon 20 acres of land in each of three years.
