Delay in U.S. Construction Program is Fixed by **Investigating Judges**

Washington, Oct. 31.—The long awaited report on the aircraft investigation conducted during the last five months by Charles E. Hughes, and Attorney-General Gregory was placed before President Wilson yesterday by the attorney-general.

Delays and waste of the production program, the report declares

were due chiefly to "the defective organization of the work of aircraft production and the serious lack of competent direction of that work by nal corps."

No fault is found with the manage-

ment of aircraft affairs since the re-organization of last May, which placed John D. Ryan in charge.

The report finds no "graft" in the generally accepted sense, but makes recommendations for proceedings against army officers held guilty of dealing with corporations in which

they were interested. Mr. Hughes in his report referred to the retention by Henry Ford of Carl Emde as chief of his drafting department, despite charges against Emde of pro-German utterances. He said there were indications of a "laxity at the Ford plant with respect to those of German sympathies, which was not at all compatible with the interests of the government.


