ANNOUNCEMENT

Armistice Signed and Continued Peace Expected

Monday morning at five o'clock telegrams arrived giving official notice that the Germans had signed the Armistice making an unconditional surrender to the Allies. By 5.30 the bells, whistles, horns and guns pealed forth notifying the sleeping and awakened citizens that the expected news had arrived and the war was ended. The streets were soon alive with people and Mayor Yould having proclaimed a holiday the people closed all places of business and gave up the day to praise, thanksgiving and celebration.

At 2.30 o'clock the people repaired to different churches and there joined full heartily in thanksgiving to God for His guiding hand in overruling despotism cruelty and injustice. The Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian united in their service in the stone church where the pastor Rev. R. B. Layton gave an inspiring address.

In the afternoon a procession was formed and paraded the town. This was again repeated in the evening where a magnificent procession of most gaily decorated autos, teams, fire wagons with bands, mounted citizens and people on foot paraded all over the town and went to the Cornwallis bridge where a bonfire was burning and fire works blazed forth from the Sanatorium hill.

Before the parade prayer, was offered by Dr. Donohue and addresses were given at the Band Stand by Mayor Yould, Hon. Barclay Webster, H. H. Wickwire, Pros. Blair, Lieut. Estabrooks, Lieut. Ralph Layton, G. E. Graham and Dr. J. Borden. Patriotic music was furnished by the bands.

The demonstrations throughout the town was not only impressive but everwhelming outpouring of joy of people who had suffered and suffered much through four long years. Mothers, fathers, wives, sisters, sweethearts, brothers who had made sacrifices of loved ones rushed forth to acclaim the good news which proclaimed a happy homecoming in the future with but few sad messages of death somewhere in France.

Daughter of Kentville Family Dies at Brockton.

Brockton Mass., October 25th—Apparently recovering from a severe illness of influenza contracted while she was nursing epidemic patients at the local field tent hospital, Miss Nellie A. Gray aged 25, expired suddenly this noon at the hospital. Miss Gray was one of a group of nurses rushed to aid Brockton physicians during the serious epidemic which raged here for nearly a month. Arriving here she was assigned to the temporary tent hospital and did yeoman service. With the situation rapidly clearing she eventually collapsed from overwork. Pneumonia threatened but she escaped it. Mayor Gleason chatted with her this morning and she stated that she was feeling so well she would probably leave for home Thursday. An hour later a message was received that she had died. She was a great favorite at the camp and an untiring worker.
