It has been described as a very active and impulsive member—if a hand can be said to be impulsive—and it is certainly always on the move. The Kaiser's hand is rather large, and to be honored with a grip of it is an experience not likely soon to be forgotten.

One feels almost as if his hand were in a vise, and physically it is a relief to find it free again. His Mejesty takes a delight in administering a vigorous squeeze to a newcomer who is unaware of his little hand-shaking peculiarity. On such an occasion it is remarked by people about the court that the Emperor has been making another of his lasting im-

The hand of the Czar of Russia is anything but typical of its power. It is, indeed, more in keeping with its owner's physique than with his exalted position as autocrat of all the Russias. It is of rather less than medium size, and one critical observer has written it down as a very weak hand. The fingers are said not to show much in the way of character; although the Czar is not without his strong points, even if they do not ooze out at the tips of his

fingers. George Washington, the founder of American independance, was the possessor of quite remarkable hands. They were of only medium size, but the thumb was really enormously large. The immortal Nelson had a very interesting hand. It was by no means a large one, and may be said to have been in correct proportion to his general physique, which, as everybody knows, was small. From Britain's great naval hero one naturally turns to our most notable military commander. It has been said that the most remarkable features of the Duke of Wellington's hand were his thumbs. Although there was nothing about them that could be described as abnormal, they were suggestive of grim determination and an iron grip. Fingers, thumbs and knuckles all indicated strength, and the hand of Wellington can be best summed up as the strong

hand of a strong man. The late Earl of Beaconsfield had very good hand. It was rather under than over the medium size, with well-formed fingers, slender and of fair length. Disraeli always took care of his hands, which, after all, have a great deal to do with personal appearance. Anybody could see that his belonged to a man of refined tastes, unlimited ambition and the

requisite self-assurance and power of perseverance to satisfy it. Mr. Gladstone's hand was, like his temperament, the very reverse of his doughty opponent's. Not that the G. O. M. was lacking in refinement, ambition or dogged determination His was a big, broad, powerful hand, as the despatch boxes which he was wont to thump in the House of Comnons would doubtless declare if they

could only speak. More than anything else, perhaps, Gladstone's hand was the orator's The writer has heard and seen most of the leading speakers of the period, but none who could make a gesture with the same dramatic effect as the late Liberal leader. The way in which he could, when moved, shake his clenched hand at the Opposition at Westminster was more expressive of his impetuosity and impatience than even the language which he employed to convey it. The thumb would appear to be

true index to character. John Milton of "Paradise Lost" fame had a small hand, with taper fingers; but his thumb was of extraordinary size. On the other hand. I ouis XVI., whose indecision became notorious as the cause of all his misfortunes. a very small, weak thumb. Sir Wal-Scott had a nand of only moder. ate size. His fingers were slim, with conical tips; and it is remark-able that Victor Hugo had much the same kind of hands. The hand of Beethoven was broad and thick, but by no means heavy, Its leading characteristics were a strong impulse and

Exhibition of Irish Industries. Cork is to hold an industrial exhibition of irish industries next year, CAR FOR LIVE FISH.

Seand Trunk Railway Company Builds One for the Express l'urpose of Stocking Ontario Lakes.

Owing to the thousands of tourists and anglers who each year make the districts in Northern Ontario their summer resort, the fish in several of the lakes have suffered to some extent; and to obviate any depletion or extermination the Grand Trunk Reflway, in conjunction with the Ontario Government, has formulated a scheme for restocking many of the waters in the Highlands of Ontario. not by depositing eggs, fry or finger-lings, but by transplanting the par-ent fish early in the spring, in time to take advantage of the spawning season. With this end in view the Grand Trunk Railway System has its shops at Point St. Charles a special car for the transportation of these fish from the place of their capture to the different lakes which are being stocked.

Heretofore the stocking of lakes has been hampered for the want of the proper means for the transportation of the fish. Young fish, fry and fingerlings, were carried by messengers in baggage cars on regular passenger trains. This method inadequate and the Grand Trunk recognized the fact that a fish car would have to be put in service to transport fish in large numbers. A car was therefore constructed speci ally adapted for the distribution of live fish, the requirements of such a car being compartments for carry-ing fish in which an even temperature could be maintained, proper circulation of water and air in the tanks containing the fish and sleeping and living accommodations for the tendants. The interior of the car is arranged with a series of galvanized iron tanks to hold from 1,000 to 1, 500 fish. At one end of the car is an upper and lower berth, like those in a Pullman car, to accommodate two men. The ice for keeping the water at a certain temperature is in two compartments built for this purpose and holding about one ton each. Arrangements have been made for replenishing the water in the tanks, en route, which will be done by attaching a hose, provided with a coupling, to any of the hydrants at stations on the Grand

The Ontario Government has already contracted for 10,000 parent The first shipment has been planted in the waters known as the "Lake of Bays," situated in Northern Ontario, about 145 miles from Toronto. The fish now being transplanted are what are known as the small-mouthed black bass, one of the gamiest species of the finny kingdom, and are being caught at Williams on Lake Erie. Those which have been captured and transplanted are considered by experts as an exceptionally fine lot of fsh, not one out of all that were loaded on the first shipment being less than a foot in length and many weighing three to four pounds. Another carload has been forwarded to the Muskoka. Lakes, and posited in Lake Rosseau. This work will be continued until the lakes in

the northern districts are thoroughly stocked. The other lakes which will be re stocked are Lakes Joseph, Muskoka, Couchiching, Simcoe, and the Ka-wartha lakes. Though the fishing in all these waters has been good in the past, the lover of the rod and the amateur angler will be assured now of unlimited sport in any of these districts.
