POOR AIM OF ASSASSIN

Saves Life of Vice-Admiral Dou-
bassoff From Bomb.

Governor-General of Moscow Had Back
Burned, Leg Bruised and Was
Thrown From His Carriage Among
Horses' Heels by Explosion—Coach-
man's Skull Fractured, a Sentry
Killed and Several Bystanders Hurt.

Moscow, May 7.—A bomb was thrown
at the carriage of Vice-Admiral Dou-
bassoff, Governor-General of Moscow,
as he was being driven to the palace
yesterday. Access to the palace is
barred.

Vice-Admiral Doubassoff's life was
saved by the poor aim of his would-be
assassin. The bomb exploded on the
pavement several paces to the rear of
his carriage, hurling the mutilated
corpse of the terrorist several yards
backward and tearing off the arm and
the face of an aide who was descend-
ing from the carriage. Gen. Doubassoff
was thrown from his carriage and un-
der the horses' heels. His back was
burned and his leg bruised, but he was
able to walk unassisted into the palace.
The coachman's skull was fractured and
he was taken to a hospital. Several
bystanders were injured, and a sentry
was killed.

Grand Dukes in Danger.

London, May 7.—A despatch from
Paris to the Exchange Telegraph Co.
states that the Grand Dukes Vladimir
and Alexis of Russia have been advised
that they will be running a great dan-
ger if they remain in Paris. It is un-
derstood that they will leave immedi-
ately.

Parliament To Be Free.

St. Petersburg, May 7.—The Associa-
ted Press was enabled to give Saturday
night the policy of the new Ministry on
the all-important agrarian question.

The Government will not attempt to
dictate to, or even direct, the Parlia-
mentary majority. Instead, it will pro-
pose the formation of a Parliamentary
commission upon which the responsi-
bility of elaborating an agrarian project
will fall. This is virtually equivalent
to accepting the decision of the Consti-
tutional Democrats.

Furthermore, the Government will of-
fer no objection to the institution of
universal suffrage. As a matter of fact
the Parliament will be permitted to act
freely as long as it does not assail the
fundamental laws of the Russian state.
The Emperor, however, reserves the
right to threaten impeachment by the
victorious majority of Government of-
ficials.

Another One Goes.

News was received at the session of
the Constitutional Democratic congress
last night of the assassination of the
Governor of Elizabetopol in revenge
for his savage repression in the Cau-
casus.

Cheer Assassins.

A feature of the session was the pic-
turesque scene when the news was re-
ceived of the attack upon Governor
General Doubassoff at Moscow. It was
then supposed the attack had been suc-
cessful. The convention took a recess
and cheered the assassin and the deed
for 10 minutes.

Count Witte For Paris.

London, May 7.—The Daily Tele-
graph's St. Petersburg correspondent
says it is reported that Count Witte
may be appointed Russian ambassador
to Paris.

Chinese Recruiting in Manchuria.
London, May 7.—Official confirmation
has been received at the War Office
from Harbin of the report that the Chi-
nese Generals Ma and Yuan Shi Kai
are increasing their forces in the south
of Manchuria.

It is stated that recruiting is going
on in the district of Ninguta, that Chi-
nese troops from Manchuria have been
sent to Kirin, and that twelve hundred
horses, which were bought during the
Russian demobilization, are concentrated
at Jiamusi. In China volunteer
militia is being formed. Thousands of
young men are enlisting and meet twice
a week for drill.

REVENUE SHOWS INCREASE.

All Departments Assist For Ten Months
Ended April 30.

Ottawa, May 7.—The statement of the
Finance Department for the ten months
of the current fiscal year up to the
end of April shows a revenue of \$63,-
808,350, expenditure on consolidated
and \$45,243,499, and capital expenditure
of \$10,421,765. As compared with last
year the revenue shows an increase of
\$6,677,848, the consolidated fund expendi-
ture of \$1,330,841.

For the month of April the revenue
of \$4,732,736 represented an improve-
ment of \$1,093,053 over the correspond-
ing month of last year. The expendi-
ture of \$3,642,118 on consolidated fund
was an increase of \$34,577 and the cap-
ital outlay of \$1,285,432 was \$79,854
larger than last year, chiefly on account
of railway subsidy payments.

Every revenue producing branch of
the public service contributed toward
the improved showing.

CRUSHED COUPLING CARS.

Harry Johnston, Young Brakeman, Badly
Hurt at Orangeville.

Orangeville, May 7.—While coupling
cars in the station yard here about 6.30
Saturday night Harry Johnston, a
C. P. P. brakeman, was caught and
badly crushed between two sections of
a freight train. The engine stopped a
few short feet as Johnston stepped
between the cars it started again. The
couplers catching him fairly in the
abdomen and small of the back.

He was at once taken to the home
of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jas.
Keyes, where he is now lying in a
state of collapse from his injuries and
the nervous shock. Johnston is about
20 years of age. His father, who was
an engine driver, was killed near
Brampton a number of years ago.

Later—Harry Johnston died from his
injuries at 1.15 yesterday morning.

FINE CUT FACTS.

Much Information Gathered From a
Variety of Sources and About Many
Subjects in a Few Lines.

Workmen recently cut down two fine
old elm trees in Salem to save the ex-
pense of cleaning them of the brown-
tail and gypsy moths.

Ram bows are to be discarded by
the British admiralty for future battle-
ships. H. M. S. Dreadnought, now un-
der construction at Portsmouth, will
not have a ram.

A homing pigeon five months old at
the time was released on the Isle of
Man in August, 1903. It was long ago
given up for lost. At last it has re-
turned to its loft in Liverpool.

A Turkish soldier goes into battle
without ever having fired a rifle in his
life, as not even blank cartridges are
served out to regiments on drill, so
great is the fear of an uprising.

All Mussulmans over twenty are
amenable to military service and are
only exempt after they have passed the
age of forty, but all inhabitants of Con-
stantinople, even Mussulmans, are ex-
empt from serving in the army.

Mohammed Ben Terna, a young
Moorish grandee, has gone mad from
unavailing efforts to keep three wives
together in peace and seclusion in a
palace in Paris. Mohammed goes to an
asylum and his wives go back to Tan-
gier.

American locomotives are not a suc-
cess in the Japanese railway bureau. It
is claimed that the boilers are leaky and
the rivets imperfectly fastened. In
many instances the parts were damaged
through bad packing.

Few wild animals are left in New
Zealand. The Government takes good
care of the remnants and seeks to add
new varieties. Among recent importa-
tions are chamois from the Austrian
Alps, which ought to flourish in the
mountains of New Zealand.

Charles Flint of Candia, N. H., is the
owner of a biscuit which was given his
father as a souvenir of his visit to the
frigate Constitution in 1855 when the
vessel was lying in the harbor at Ports-
mouth. The biscuit is oval in shape,
three inches by two, two inches thick.

Palladium, a rare substance little
used as the active agent in automatic
gas lighting devices. Flame is produced
as soon as the illuminating gas
strikes a pellet of asbestos covered
with a mixture of palladium and finely
divided platinum, known as platinum
black.

The latest novelty in vegetables is a
black potato, which has been sent to a
well known seed merchant of London.
This eccentric tuber came from the
Congo and is said to have an excel-
lent flavor. It is especially recom-
mended for ornamental cookery and in
salads.

In altering an old hotel in New York
city it has been found that the beams,
floor boards and woodwork are of solid
mahogany. The structure would prove
a perfect mine of wealth if it could be
raised, but the owner refuses to allow
this to be done under any circum-
stances.

Jan. 1, 1872, Ebenezer Drake of Me-
chanic Falls, Me., placed \$50 in a sav-
ings bank for the benefit of a cemetery
association. The money is not avail-
able until it has increased to \$100,000.
It now amounts to \$200, and it is fig-
ured that the association will get the
money in 2053.

Because of lack of funds work on
Lippincott's Dictionary of the English
Language has ceased. Twenty Ameri-
can scholars, working fourteen years,
representing an outlay of \$400,000,
have reached the word dog. B. Ber-
tram Lippincott, its projector, expected
to finish the work in five years.

Australia's different states having
agreed to prohibit the sale and growth
of opium, the Commonwealth Govern-
ment has prohibited the importation of
opium except for medicinal purposes.
All the states will lose revenue by the
prohibition. The loss to Queensland
alone is estimated at \$80,000 yearly.

Mount Matutu, on the island of Sa-
vall, Samoan group, has covered thirty
square miles of land around it with
lava, and a stream twelve miles wide
is flowing into the sea. The lava is
thrown up 1,200 feet and at latest ac-
counts had increased the height of the
mountain since Aug. 21 by 3,000 feet.

Ed. Poole of Lynn, Mass., has two
pets which probably cannot be dupli-
cated in a day's journey. One is a pe-
crow which lives in a little house in
the back yard. The other is the com-
panion of the crow, a big rat. The rat
occupies quarters in the crow's house,
and they eat from the same dish. Both,
too, are largely engaged in avoiding
cats and dogs.

The height of the great Victoria falls
of the Zambesi river, in South Africa,
is much more than double that of Ni-
agara falls, but the average volume of
water flowing over the African precipi-
ce is so much less than that of the
Canadian river that in horsepower the
Victoria falls probably average only
about 15 to 20 per cent. as much as
the Canadian cataract.

Off Gibraltar the British channel
fleet has been practicing night firing
at a novel target. It is shaped like a
destroyer and is outlined with incan-
descent lamps that can be switched on
or off at will from the towing boat. The
idea is to make the practice as realis-
tic as possible. Out of the darkness the
"destroyer" suddenly springs, giving
the gunners only a few seconds to take
aim before she disappears again.

The great Croton dam, which will
hold New York's water supply, has
been completed after ten years of con-
tinuous labor. The last stone was plac-
ed by Comptroller Meigs in the pres-
ence of the city officials. The dam is
nineteen miles in length and varies in
thickness from a mile at the breast to
a quarter of a mile at the wings. The
dam is 260 feet deep, reaching below
the surface of the earth an average of
100 feet.
