WIVES WARN BALFOUR

That Hungry Men Are Desperate and Blood May Flow.

Premier With Pleas on Aid to Unemployed—Poc Desperate Straits, and Mr. Crooks. M. P., Urges Them to Persevere Until All Had Work.

London, Nov. 7.—The desperate condition of the poor of London was brought to the notice of Premier Balur yesterday by a remarkable depu tation of the wives and other women relatives of the unemployed, who did not hesitate to tell the Premier that unless something is speedily done to lessen their sufferings there will be

"Don't forget that hungry men are desperate men," said one of the speak-ers. All had the same tale to tell of husbands out of work and starving wives and calidren. Enormous crowds of women from all parts of London marched through

the street, headed by a deputation, which Mr. Balfour received at the office of the local Government board. Only thirty of the women were admitted to the presence of Mr. Balfour. The Premier was very sympathetic. He acknowledged that the evil was very real, but he had little to suggest in the way of alleviation, except an expression of hope that public charity yould come to the aid of the unen ployed. They had his genuine sym-pa'hy and he felt most acutely the magnitude of the evil from which they

vere suffering. A mass meeting of the women was held at 3 o'clock in the afternoon to hear the report of the delegation. Mr. Crooks, M.P., and others, made speech-es, Mr. Crooks said that Mr. Bairour's reply to the delegation was unworthy of the Premier of a great country. He added that they had started an agita-tion which would not cease until every nan who wanted work was supplied with sufficient to support his wife and

with sufficient to support his wife and children.

The speaker urged his hearers to continue the agitation. He said that a revolution in England would not be behind the revolution in Russia in securing the demands of the people.

MORE EQUITABLE LOOSENESS. Books Baffle Investigation Says Superintendent Hendricks In His Report.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 7.—That the ooks of the Equi able Life Assurance Society, as they were kept under the Hyde-Alexander management, were in such loose shape they were baffling to investigators, and that the real estate holdings of the society had been car-ried on the books at a valuation \$5. 000,000 greater than it should have been were two of the sensational disclosures made by State Superintendent Hen-dricks in a supplementary report on the condition of the society, which was nade public yesterday after almos our months of probing into the affairs

of the company.

In fact, it was asserted, the condition of the books and youchers was such that at times it was necessary for the examiners of the department to go entirely outside the society to ascertain whether it or others owned valuable securities. One important transaction, the so-called Turner loan, Superintendent Hendricks reports, was omitted entirely from the books of the society, though it carried with it a check for \$600,000 drawn by the society to the Mercantile Trust Co. on Feb. 4, 1904. In this instance it was necessary for the examiners to consult with the state superintendent of banks, and make ar examination of the books of the Mer-cantile Trust Co.

Girl Attempts Suicide.

Campbellford, Nov. 7.—May Em-law, 19 years old, attempted suicide vesterday by leaping into the Trent River. A number of young men cross-ing the bridge at the time saw the girl floundering in the water and rushed to her rescue. After much difficulty she vas brought to shore in an exhausted ondition. The cause of her rash act s attributed to her mother's efforts to orce her into marriage with a man she lislikes. There is little doubt that the girl was in an almost insane condition when she made the attempt upon her

Newfoundland's Protest.

St. John's, Nfid., Nov. 7.—The Government of Newfoundland has forwarded to the British Cabinet a formal protest against American vessels hiring Newfoundlanders outside of the three-mile limit or in Canadian ports to as-sist in taking herrings in Newfound-land waters on the ground that this is an evasion of the letter, and the spirit of the treaty of 1818, which concedes the inshore fishery privileges only to the inshore fishery privileges only to actual inhabitants of the United States. The British Government has transmitted the protest to Washington.

A Costly Leak. Peterboro, Nov. 7.—A rather dangerous leak has developed in the reach of Peterboro's hydraulic lift lock. There is a large hold in the west bank, through which the water runs and un less repaired the entire bank may be worn away. About \$6,000 has been spent in repairs during the past sea-son, and it is said that \$20,000 will be required to permanently repair and place the embankments in proper con



SIR GEORGE WILLIAMS DEAD.

Organizer and Founder of the Young Men's Christian Association.

Men's Christian Association.
London, Nov. 7.—Sir George Williams, president and founder of the Y.M.C.A. of the world, died yesterday at Torqual, in his 85th year.
Sir George Williams, born in 1821, was educated at Gloyne's School, Tiverton, Devonshire. He was a member of the firm of Hitchcock, Williams & Co., warehousemen. The Y.M.C.A. movement began in a remarkable way 61 years ago. George Williams and Edward Beaumont, both earning small

salaries, as clerks, were gging over Blackfriar's bridge in London one night, on their way home from work, when they began a serious conversa-

"Teddy," asked Williams, "are you willing to make a sacrifice for your re-

Teddy replied in the affirmative, "If you lead I'll follow," he said simply.
Williams' proposal was that they should get their fellow clerks together and set a society on foot so that they might, help one another to lead better lives. Their projects were made known, and on June 6, 1844, the first Y.M.C.A. was organized by the 12 young clerks. Clerks in other shops beyoung clerks. Clerks in other shops be-stirred themselves, the movement pros-pered in England, and in seven years there were branches in Scotland, Ire-land, Canada and the United States. The Y.M.C.A. secured the attention of the Earl of Shaftesbury, who be-came its president, remaining at its head for 30 years. The late Sir George Williams was only the other day described as one of

only the other day described as one of the happiest men in England. He was knighted by Queen Victoria in 1894.
