## Sale of Ranch Lands

There is a large force of men engaged in preparing the land for trees, shrubs and flowers. Several care of trees will be required and these are all ordered and will be in this month for planting.

The many friends of Mr. A. T. Henson will be pleased to know that he is being on the high road to recovery since his bad accident a few days ago. Dr. Pickup placed his ankle in the cast on the first of the week and he is now making good progress. His presence was missed at the T. bernacle when the Orchestra gave their musical program last Sunday, but under the conditions the musicians acquitted themselves with credit, and Mr. Alex Campbell, who wielded the baton, is also to be congratulated. All will be pleased to see Mr. Henson around again, and during his confinement to his room, Mrs. Henson is doing nobly by their pupils in music. We have no more ardent workers in the musical affairs of the Town than Mr. and Mrs. Henson.

Seeding is in progress all over the district and in many places they have been at work for the past ten days. Possibly there is more actual seeding done in the Glenwood country and east than elsewhere. Mr. O. A. Bigelow from the upper end of the district reports that seeding is making good progress, while from the east end Mr. Walter Olsen reports that they are farther along and his father, Mr. B. F. Olsen has 135 acres seeded. To the south in the Aetna and Kimball districts they are working the land before seeding, but this week will see all the drills running. The Woolford district is also very busy and their seeding is under way also. West there is not much seeded as yet, but they are busy plowing or cultivating. In the Del Bonita country they have also a little earlier start than in the foothill country and they are very busy preparing the soil and some seeding has been done. The soil conditions are now excellent and all things point to a favorable seeding in this district. There is only one little cloud on the horizon—i.e., the present price of wheat and other grains.

## Board of Health Praised For Prompt Action

There was an interesting meeting of the Board of Health last week, when Dr. V. E. Barrow, of the Department of Public Health Edmonton, met with the Mayor as chairman, W. H. Caldwell, J. F. Parish, J. W. Low and Dr. W. S. Pickup, the M. H. O. for this district, together with the Town Constable and the Town Solicitor, at the Court House. The action of the Health Board was duly reported and Dr. Barrow approved the action taken, saying that if they had erred in any way under the circumstances it was on the side of leniency. The conditions had warranted decisive and prompt action and he was pleased that they had been so successful in preventing an epidemic.

## Increased Business In View

Our local lumber merchant, Mr. H. D. Folsom is showing his faith in the future by greatly increasing his yard facilities.

He has purchased the lot to the west of his present yard, is removing the two storey, six roomed house and the barn formerly occupying it farther to the west, so as to increase his frontage on the north by fifty feet.

The buildings are being moved by Mr. John Larson and a force of some four or five men, and the work is being accomplished quite effectively also.

This additional room will now

place all Mr. Folsom's stock together and will increase his capacity for handling it nearly one hundred per cent., and give him 150 feet by 100 feet for his yard, possibly being the largest in town on such a convenient street.

Truly it is refreshing to see our business men with such a spirit of optimism for the future of conditions in our town. It takes men of broad vision and full faith in our productive district to prepare thus for the growth that is bound to come when all are crying "Hard Times." We congratulate Mr. Folsom on his policy of expansion.
