RUSSIAN CITY HAS INTERESTING FAIR

Market At Nijni Novgorod Has Been Established for Two Hundred Years

Nijni Novgorod, Russia, Oct. 1.—This great fair is well worth a visit by any who may be in its neighborhood in August, when it is held. The writer travelled from London to Nijni Novgorod for no other purpose and was not disappointed. Very many fairs are held in Russia; until recently the greater part of the commerce of this huge and fertile country was conducted in this manner. But the railways have altered this.

This particular fair has been established about 200 years and is called the "Jamarg," a corruption of German words, meaning the yearly market. The buildings in which the fair is held are good, permanent houses of two stories; the upper one being used for living in, while the lower is devoted to business. By far the greater part of the transactions are wholesale and goods to an enormous value change hands here.

Wool, horsehair and cordage are staple commodities, though the largest trade is done in skins, and these are to be seen in millions. But there is also a considerable retail trade and here all was arranged to attract the ordinary tourist. The goods are arranged on stalls under huge glass covered arcades and many hours were spent examining the great variety of objects displayed.

Glittering trifles from France stood beside tables covered with flasks of perfume from Japan. Here was shown the homeliest knitted garments for underclothing. All strings of lovely pearls from the Black sea, on the next wooden bread platters, and everywhere piles on piles of Russian hand made lace, in every variety, from the most elegant long evening coats in artistic designs to the very durable edgings that serve so well for curtains and other household uses.

Wandering along the endless lines of the open-air booths where the coarser lace is mostly sold, the writer observed a woman taking her midday meal in the midst of her wares. Curious to know what the woman was eating, she took the wooden bowl and spoon from the woman, who smilingly consented, and tasted it. It proved to be a very palatable mess of fowl broth thickened with macaroni and the edible fungus so universally eaten in Russia.

Inquiring the price, it appeared that it cost the very modest sum of four kopecks, or one penny, but if there had been meat in it it would have cost six kopecks. A purchase of lace was then made much to the pleasure of the woman, who said that it was her first sale.

At last it was impossible to go on looking at things, however strange or interesting, and a visit was then made to the Kremlin, or castle that overlooks the town and mighty stream of the Volga. The ascent to this fortress was made by a wire rope railway, and it was impossible to help wondering what would have been the feelings of those warriors who at one time defended these old walls with bows and arrows, could they have seen their castle stormed in this strange fashion. Having admired the view of unlimited plain and forest, a descent into the town was again made and the Volga crossed by a steamer.

It was interesting to observe the great mass of shipping, for the rivers of Russia are still the chief way of transporting goods and passengers. A party of English ladies was just embarking in one of the great steamers for a journey of five days down the river to the Caspian sea, it would have been delightful to have gone with them. From Moscow a visit to the fair takes 36 hours, the two journeys are taken at night and one day is sufficient for the fair.

DRIVING OUT DEVILS
St. Petersburg, Oct. 1.—St. Paraskeva's Day has again passed, with a renewal of the fanatical and revolting

scenes in the suburbs of St. Petersburg, and, as usual, the railroad companies have run special trains to allow thousands of the lower classes to witness and take part in the degrading spectacle of driving out devils from almost naked men and women by means of muddy water and unclarified oil.

The power of driving a personal devil out of unfortunate human beings is credited to St. Paraskeva, and on her holy day every year thousands of ignorant wretches submit to violent tortures in order to be cured of their sins, the usual treatment being for brawny peasants to raise in their arms the poor, unfortunate women, clad only in a single undergarment, so that they may kiss the face of the saint, placed high on the wall of the church dedicated to her. Then impure water and unclarified oil are forced down the throats of the victims.

The idea of unclotting the women is that there shall be no knot, bow or other fastening where the devil and his coadjutors may find a refuge.

The treatment of the first victim to approach the saint is typical. One young peasant lifted her in the air, two others held her arms fully extended, while a fourth seized her loosened hair and, dragging her head from side to side and up and down, shouted, "Kiss, kiss St. Paraskeva!"

The woman's garment was soon in tatters. She began groaning. One of the men exclaimed: "Get out, Satan! Say where thou art lodged!" The woman's head was pulled back by the hair, her mouth was forced open and mud-colored water was poured into it.

She spat the water out and was heard to moan: "Oh, they are drowning me!" The young man exultantly exclaimed: "So we've got you, devil, have we? Leave her at once or we will drown you!" He continued pouring water in the victim's mouth, and after that unclarified oil.

The unfortunate woman was again raised and her face pressed against the image. "Kiss it! Kiss it!" she was commanded, and she obeyed. She was asked who was the cause of her being "possessed." "Anna," was the whispered reply. Who was Anna? What was her village? In which cottage did she live?

The physical and mental sufferings of the first victim lasted an hour, at the end of which time she was handed over to her relatives.
