## CENTREVILLE WANTS BASEBALL

Reporter From That Live Town  
Puts Forward Some Good Ideas

We are more than pleased to heartily concur with the effort being put forth in some of the adjacent towns to make amateur baseball, a real live issue this season. Personally I have in juvenile and adult years been a most valiant advocate of this clean, vigorous game and no stalwart healthy boy's paradise would be quite complete without a baseball diamond. The real pleasure of swatting a well-delivered ball can never really be forgotten.

In all our smaller towns there is always material available for a nine that would, with a bit of coaching, show pep enough to be worth rooting for. An active and hearty interest could be quickly made manifest in baseball, if each of these towns would organize a team that would do credit to their respective places. These teams could readily be formed into an amateur league and a representative from each management might meet at some central point to discuss methods and means and form some sort of a schedule for summer games. Of course the nature of the work which the average player would be engaged in daily might almost prohibit any arbitrary schedule for games being in advance for the whole season, as an amateur would probably have to respond to the call of legitimate business interests in preference to the game. However, the members of the different teams could doubtless adjust their time nicely week by week, so that games could be arranged with the opposing towns at the beginning of each week for that special period. At any rate if the league could once be gotten in operation the finer adjustments would almost take care of themselves. We sincerely hope, therefore, that several of our neighboring towns will take the necessary initiative in this respect and that baseball will be our friendly bone of contention through the long summer months.

John M. Keefe, barrister, of Grand Falls.

Mr. Keefe, whose home was at Lakeville in this county, upon completion of a High School Course, graduated from the Provincial Normal School and taught school for some years. After pursuing academic courses at the University of New Brunswick and St. Joseph's College, he studied law at Dalhousie, Halifax, and received the degree of LL.B. from that University in the class of 1911. He was admitted as an Attorney of the Supreme Court



in 1913, and as a Barrister the following year. Since admission to the bar, he had practised his profession at Grand Falls, with marked success. During the past two sessions of the Legislature, Mr. Keefe has acted as Clerk Assistant of the House, and has received the B.O.L. degree from King's College upon examination.

## HON. F. B. CARVELL GETS SUBSIDY

For Harbor Improvements at St. John

Parliament voted \$750,000 this afternoon for St. John harbor, but not until there had been quite a discussion as to the relative merits of St. John and Halifax harbors. Hon. Frank Carvell, minister of public works, said that the St. John drydock, which will accommodate the largest ships afloat in the world today, will probably be completed in the summer of 1921, and added that St. John harbor would be one of the finest in Canada when it was completed. "It is a costly development, but geographically it is in the place where most of the business is being done," asserted the minister. "The people of St. John deserve great credit. They had the courage to make it a National port and to plan for the trans-Atlantic business."

## SPECIAL MEETING TOWN COUNCIL

Various Matters Discussed and New Water Rates Announced

A special meeting of the Town council was held at the Town Hall on Monday evening, May 12th. All members of the Council were present except Dr. MacIntosh.

The meeting was called for the purpose of considering by-law No. 14, which relates to the water system and water rates. This by-law consists of twenty-six sections, and is, therefore, too long to be given here in detail, but we are assured that these laws, to which we will owe our future happiness or sorrow as citizens of the Town of Hartland, will soon be handed to us in book form, and we can then peruse them at our leisure. The section of this by-law which interests the greater number of us to the greatest extent, is the one relating to the tax for domestic purposes. The old rate of taxes is annulled, and the rate, after the current year for which the town has been assessed, has expired, will be six dollars per year for a private family, and one dollar additional for a private stable in which one animal is kept, or two dollars per year if a man is lucky enough to possess more than one animal, such as cows or horses. Public garages will be taxed seven dollars per year for their water supply.

The meeting also discussed the lockup situation, but not settled on anything definite.

Notice was given that at the next regular meeting, a by-law, would be brought down regulating the storage of gasoline in the town.

After an interesting session the meeting adjourned at 11:30 p.m.
