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SPRING HILL COAL.

Gentle Development in Utah.

When I say that the non-Mormon population, which did not exceed 1000 in 1869, now numbers at least 15,000, and the four-fifths of these are men, the reader will doubtless be curious as to the effect on Mormonism. The first effect, of course, was a furious effort to suppress the growth of the population, and which, in consequence of the late reduction in freight, must take the place of all other fuel along the line of Railway between Truro and St. John, and at least on the Montreal end of the line, between that town and Riviere du Loup. Wood stoves are fast giving way to coal stoves between the first named points, and it is probable that the same fact will be observable as soon as this superior coal can be introduced along the line between Montreal and Riviere du Loup.

The Intercolonial Railway uses this coal exclusively for all locomotives and stations west of Truro.

The coal is mined in the most approved manner to insure its freedom from stone and fire-clay; the round coal is then put over a screen, which separates from it all the dust and small coal; the latter is then put through an elaborate steam rotary screen, which produces two sizes of small coal, known as "Stove" and "Nut," which are perfectly pure coals and entirely free from dust. The superior quality of the "Round" coal being fully established, the "Stove" and "Nut" is the former may be used in grates alone or mixed with the latter, many prefer it alone; the latter is unsurpassed for cooking stoves, or for small engines. The coal ignites very quickly and burns freely, thereby insuring a quick heat with but a small consumption of fuel, which is particularly desirable in summer, in winter, and when large rooms are to be heated, you have simply to add to the quantity used in summer for heating the boiler or the pot, and a lasting and economical fire is the result.

Its low price must induce all those who consider this point to give it a trial. "Stove" coal is now sold at the Mine at \$1.75 per ton, and "Nut" Coal at \$1.00 per ton. During the summer months, the coal is sold at a lower price, and operations, it can be produced more cheaply satisfactorily than during the winter; the Company will, therefore, continue these low prices until August 31st, hoping thus to induce consumers to stock up as much as they conveniently can before that date. After August 31st, the prices will be \$3.00 per ton for "Stove," and \$1.25 per ton for "Nut." The price for "Round" is \$2.50 per ton, at the mines.

Agents have been appointed at all towns and villages between Truro and St. John, and others will be appointed as fast as possible, on the North Shore Line. The coal is given out for car loads, and the consumer can tell before ordering what his coal will cost him, by adding freight, freight, and 20 per cent. branch freight. If an agent sells less than a car load he may charge an advanced rate for his trouble of retailing.

In 1875 the sales reached 53,000 tons, and it is hoped that this year's sales will nearly double those of last year, thereby proving the great appreciation of Spring Hill Coal.

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White Africans.

Stanley repeats that he has actually seen the white Africans of whom Livingstone heard. It was in January last, while crossing the broad belt which separates the Victoria and Albert lakes. He says,—

On the 9th of January we camped on the base of the tremendous mountain called Kabuga, at an altitude of 5,500 feet above the sea. From one of the many spurs of Kabuga, we obtained a passing glimpse of the king of mountains, Gambaragara, which attains an altitude of between 13,000 and 15,000 above the ocean. Snow is frequently seen, though not perpetual. On its summit dwell the chief medicine men of Kabga Rega, a people of European complexion. Some half dozen of these people I have seen, and at sight of them I was reminded of what Mukamba, King of Uziro, told Livingstone and myself respecting white people who live far north of his country. They are a handsome race, and some of the women are singularly beautiful. Their hair is kinky, but inclined to brown in color. Their features are regular, lips thin, but their noses, though well shaped, are somewhat thick at the tip. Several of their descendants are scattered throughout Uyooro, Ankori and Raanda, and the royal families of the latter powerful country are distinguished, I am told, by their pale complexions. The Queen of Sasua Island, in the Victoria Nyanza, is a descendant of this tribe.

Whence came this singular people I have had no means of ascertaining except from the Waganda, who say that the first King of Uyooro gave them the land around the base of Gambaragara Mountain, wherein through many vicissitudes, they have continued to reside for centuries. On the approach of an invading host they retreat to the summit of the mountain, the latest record of which dates the most determined of their enemies. Two years ago Emperor Mtesa despatched his Prime Minister with about 100,000 men to Gambaragara and Uyooro; but, though the great General of Uganda occupied the slopes and succeeded in a great height in pursuit, he was compelled by the inclement climate to descend without having captured more than a few black slaves, the pale-faced tribe having retreated to their impregnable fortress at the summit.

The mountain, it appears, is an extinct volcano, for on the summit is a crystal clear lake, about 500 yards in length, from the center of which rises a column-like rock to a height of 100 feet. A rim of firm rock, like a wall, surrounds the summit, within which are several villages, where the principal medicine men and his people reside.

Two men of this tribe who might be taken at first glance for Greeks in white skins, accompanied Sekajuni, a sub-chief under Sambozi, and took him to Uganda, but they were extremely uncommunicative, and in writing about the history of their tribe they obtained from them. Their diet consists of milk and bananas, and they were the only men of rank in the entire force under Sambozi who possessed more than two milch cows to supply them with milk while in the country. Sekajuni, to whom they were friendly and under whom they had enrolled themselves, stated that they rebelled against Kabga Rega, and to avoid his vengeance, sought refuge with him.

Another slope of this tribe of white complexioned people I saw the court of Mtesa, in the person of Prince Namioju, the brother of the reigning King Nyika, of Gambaragara. When I first saw him I took him for a young Arab of Cairo, who had taken up his residence in Uganda for some unknown reason, and it was not until I had seen several specimens of the same pale color that I could believe that there existed a large and numerous tribe of people of such singular color in the heart of Africa, removed from the track of all travelers and trading caravans.

DYNAMITE is used in Scotland for clearing the land of stumps and land boulders. The earth is removed from the side of the stump, a hole made in it, and the dynamite placed with the fuse attached. The hole is then filled up and the fuse lighted and the stump made into pieces, and blown out of the ground. In breaking up the boulder stones, the dynamite is simply placed on top of the stone, covered with wet sand, and fired with fuse in the ordinary way. The result is the reduction of the boulders to fragments the size of a walnut.
