### Veteran and Youngster Meet in Most Attractive Play of the Day

Beaconsfield, Que., June 30.—The battle of the golf giants began this morning, when players entered the third round of the Canadian Amateur championships. The situation which brings together George S. Lyon, of Lambton, many times champion, and aged sixty-two, and J. H. McCulloch, of Beaconsfield, aged eighteen, naturally drew plenty of attention to this match.

Followers of the form of the players with an eye open for indications that will give a line on the next champion also gave close attention to the games of Marcus Greer, of Gran Mere, who yesterday put in a card of 68, the best of the championships and for the course. T. G. Hoblitzel, Sarnia, who came near Mr. Greer's score with a 74, W. J. and Frank Thompson, of Mississauga, and the western survivors, T. Gillespie and C. W. Hague, Calgary, and J. T. Cuthbert, of Winnipeg.

# Harness Racing Season To Be Opened Tomorrow

### Eight Meetings on the Holiday at the New Brunswick Tracks

### FOUR RACES ON THE LOCAL CARD

### The Quartette of Locally Owned Horses in the Sweepstakes Race.

The curtain on the harness racing season in New Brunswick will be rung up tomorrow when Dominion Day will be marked by racing in no less than seven cities and towns.

Fredericton, Moncton, St. Stephen and Woodstock will have races at which the Maritime and Maine Circuit stables will make their first appearances while matinee races are scheduled for Chatham, Campbellton and St. John. The rival Fredericton and Moncton meetings are naturally attracting the most attention because of the scramble these two tracks engaged in in trying to secure horses.

At Moncton three races are on the programme, the first being a free for all trot, a 2.19 trot and a 2.20 pace. Indications are there will be three starters in the free for all trot, the trio being Brage, J. Forbes and Clay Wain. The 2.19 trot will have Roy Miller, Bevilous, Mayor Todd and Budmore and from the 2.20 mixed list four starters will doubtless be chosen.

Four Races Here.

Fredericton's programme was augmented this morning by a four cornered sweepstakes in which the starters will be four local horses, the owners of which have deposited forfeits of \$25 each. The quartette are: Linda Hingen, owned by E. O. McDonald; P. S., owned by P. S. Watson; Star Todd, owned by Roy W. Smith, and Idle Moments, owned by Ald. Harold M. Young.

In addition there will also be the three races on the original programme which are expected to produce some of the best racing ever seen at the local track. In the free for all the starters will be Frank Fox, 2.05 1/4; The Exposer, 2.06, and Roy Volo, 2.13 1/4; the 2.17 trot will have Gay Moko, 2.16 1/4; Border Prince, 2.15 1/4; Victoria, 2.15 1/4, and King Wilkes, 2.09 1/4, and Singer, 2.15 1/4.

There are three races on the programme for St. Stephen and four at Woodstock, Frank P. Fox, the Boston trainer, having one entry at the latter meeting.

Ball Game and Band Concert.

While the heavy rain today will doubtless make all the tracks more or less busy tomorrow, the local management said today they expected the local track would dry out rapidly tomorrow morning if the weather should turn fine in the meantime. The racing is scheduled to start at 2 p. m., and the Fredericton Brass Band will march to the track at 1.15 p. m. from the corner of Queen and Ross streets. R. J. ("Bob") McKee, of Port Fairfield, Me., will act as starter and during the afternoon there will be a baseball game between Marysville and Y. M. C. A. teams, leaders in the York County Baseball League, as an additional attraction. The new management plans to keep things going at a lively pace and with four races, a baseball game and a band concert have an overflowing programme. The free for all race will be on the "three heats" plan, the 2.15 pace and the 2.17 trot will both be raced on the "three heats" plan and it has not yet been decided how the sweepstakes matched race will be contested.

Some out-of-town horsemen are already here, the rivalry between the St. John entries in the 2.15 class—King Wilkes and Singer—having attracted a number of St. John horsemen. Both St. John jockeys have been working well since arriving here and there is considerable feeling between their backers.

## Lining Up the Campaigners

There is every indication of a satisfactory entry for the Fredericton Park Association's intermittent closing purses to be raced the last week in July and the early closing events to be raced in September, which closed last night, but lists will not be compiled for several days.

Entries for Woodstock's Maritime and Maine Circuit races on July 12th and 13th close today and it is expected there will be a large entry for that meeting. The next few days will therefore give the first accurate line on the stables which will make the Maritime and Maine Circuit campaign.
