BILL BRENNAN TO MEET DEMPSEY

Buffalo Club Negotiating With Fighters for Bout in That City

[Associated Press by Leased Wire.] Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 24.—Officials of the Queensbury Athletic Club said last night that the club is negotiating for a bout between Jack Dempsey and Bill Brennan, to be staged in Buffalo in November.

An offer of \$20,000 was made to Brennan as his share of the purse, but it was not stated what Dempsey was to receive. In view of the State Boxing Board's ruling yesterday against large purses for boxers, it was said last night by club officials that the plans would be revised and the men would be asked to fight on a percentage basis.

Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, has agreed to bring Dempsey here, it was said, although the details of the financial arrangements are still unsettled.

DOWNY CHAMPION MIDDLEWEIGHT NOW

[Associated Press by Leased Wire.] Columbia, O., Aug. 24.—Bryan Downey, of Cleveland, is the middleweight champion of the world, according to a decision of the Ohio State Association of Boxing Commissioners at a meeting here today.

Invitation were sent to Jimmy Dunn, Downey's manager, and to Martin Killea, Wilson's manager, but neither attended. Dunn suggested route east via Downey to finish his training while Killea wired that Wilson is champion.

Jimmy Gardner, who referred this recent Downey-Wilson fight in Cleveland, was barred permanently from refereeing in this state and Wilson and Killea were barred for one year, starting September 7.

BOXING CONTESTS IN NEW YORK STATE

The State Athletic Commission Issues New Regulations for Boxing Bouts

[Associated Press by Leased Wire.] New York, Aug. 24.—The New York State Athletic Commission decided yesterday that, beginning September 1, all main or so-called star bouts arranged for by boxing clubs in this state must be on a percentage basis. No guarantee of special bonuses to so-called drawing cards or stars will be permitted.

The commission also adopted a rule providing for a uniform count on knockdowns.

Under the rule the timekeeper shall rise immediately after the knockdown and call the seconds from his watch up to the ninth second, and at the tenth shall strike the gong twice, while the referee, without neglecting any of the duties requiring his attention to the boxers, shall count in unison with the timekeeper as evenly as possible. When a round terminates before the count of ten is reached, the timekeeper is instructed to ring the gong twice, indicating the end of the round, and to announce how far the count has gone.

For the second day in succession Cy Williams, of the Philadelphia Nationals, hit a home run over the fence for the only run of the game. The hit decided a pitching duel between Meadows, of Philadelphia, and Freeman, of Chicago.

Nine home runs were made in the eight contests. Babe Ruth hit two and brought his total to 48. Kelly, of the Giants, made his 21st.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 24.—A victory for the Yankees over the Indians today in the second game of their series here will place the New York team in the lead in the American League pennant race.

The Indians were leading their eastern rivals by one point this morning with a percentage of .615 as against .614 for the Yankees. On the other hand, should Cleveland win today they are assured of first place throughout the series, as a defeat tomorrow would give them a percentage of .613 and New York .612.

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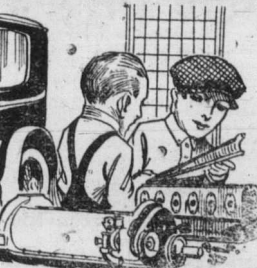
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
