

BRIDGE PLANS PLEASE ENGINEER

Will Be Better Than Was at First Thought.

Lakefield Company Goes Further Than It Was Asked.

Herbie Barr Matter to be Considered Next Wednesday.

Resident Engineer F. L. Somerville, of the Grand Trunk Railway southern division, was in the city yesterday afternoon conferring with the City Engineer Barrow in reference to the erection of the Ferris street bridge.

The plan as agreed upon originally was for a bridge with a 25-foot roadway. Yesterday, at Mr. Barrow's request, Mr. Somerville agreed to make it 30 feet wide.

That the Lakefield Cement Company has absolute confidence in the cement it is supplying to the Works Department for sidewalk construction, and apparently satisfied with the way the city is laying the walks, was proved this morning.

Chairman Wallace, of the Sewer Committee, has asked the Engineer's Department to have the estimates for the sewer to be constructed on Louisa street, just under the main drain at the head of John street, and the eastern annex sewer estimates all ready, and the cost apportioned among those entitled to bear the expense.

During this week the Health Department has received notice of three cases of measles, two each of chickenpox and diphtheria and one each of whooping cough, mumps and scarlet fever.

A meeting of the Harbor and Beach Committee has been called for 7:30 Monday evening, to deal with the application of McKenzie & Mann for a patent of a water lot.

A meeting of the Herbie Barr sub-committee is to be held on Wednesday afternoon next at which an effort will be made to get City Clerk Kent and Mr. Barr to come to an understanding.

NO DISFIGURATION.

DOCTORS MADE REPORT ON EXAMINATION OF MURDER VICTIM.

Provincial Detective Greer was a visitor at police headquarters this morning. When asked for an opinion about the result of the examination made this week, when the body of the Barton murder victim was exhumed to settle a disputed point about disfiguration of the left breast, he declined to discuss the matter until the doctors made their report.

Regarding the clothes, which are in Toronto, the officer said he took them here so that Detective Wells might see them. The fact that Mr. Wells admitted here that he measured the skirt, the detective claims, shows that he must have seen the clothing.

Crown Attorney Washington this morning received the report of Dr. Carr and Dr. Griffin, who say that there is no disfiguration of the breast.

WOMAN FATALLY ASSAULTED.

New York Watchman Charged With Horrible Deed.

Woman's Husband Choked Into Insensibility.

New York, May 12.—A powerfully-built man early to-day entered the home of August Hupfer, 76 years old, choked him into insensibility, and assaulted Mrs. Hupfer, 50 years, causing her death. This is the husband's story, and the police believe it. They arrested on suspicion James Slattery, a night watchman, employed in the building on East 75th street, where the Hupfers lived.

The life of the old man is now feared for, since his health has been poor and he has been in a state of collapse since his wife's death. Mr. Hupfer said that Slattery borrowed his revolver last night. Later a man said to be Slattery came to the Hupfer flat and was admitted by Mrs. Hupfer. The visitor sprang upon Hupfer and, after throttling him, assaulted Mrs. Hupfer. The woman was dead when a physician arrived. Hupfer declared that when he recovered and went to the window for help the night watchman mocked him from the street. Slattery was in hiding when arrested.

FOR SAN FRANCISCO.

EASTERN MEN TO INVEST THEIR MONEY IN THAT CITY.

San Francisco, May 12.—Within the past few days it is said new accounts have been opened at several of the commercial banks of San Francisco by men from the east who have deposited sums ranging from \$10,000 upward. Some of them are known by reputation to banking men to be possessed of large wealth. Others are supposed to represent wealthy clients in eastern money matters. The evident purpose of these men, the bankers say is to make investment of their funds in San Francisco.

DERBY DAY AT WOODBINE.

Court Martial Given His Final Heats This Morning.

Badger's Burrow Will Not Do for the Plate.

Toronto, Ont., May 12.—(Special to the Times).—This was Derby day at the Woodbine and nearly all of the platers were given trials. They were trials in earnest for there is not much time left for them to improve in. The Dymont plater Court Martial, was given his final heats this morning. The time was caught at 2:13. The colt broke at the head of the stretch and worked the first half of the journey alone. Will King broke in with him at the mile post and went the last mile setting the pace.

The track was faster when the Seagram horses worked than when either Wicklight or Court Martial were sent their trials. The two platers Meruko and Slaughter worked together. The colt could not cover the distance in better than 2:17 1/4. Both were well out at the end and Slaughter was urged some. Inferno from the same stable, was worked a mile to-day in 1:42 1/2, the work was done alone. Badger's Burrow will certainly not do for the plate race as the best he could do was a mile in 1:50. He worked with King Somerset, Sir Ralph covered a mile in 1:44 quite handsly. The two-year-old, King of the North, in 51 seconds, who Royal China did the same distance in 52 pulled up. The plater, Wicklight did his work alone this morning for the first part after which some of the horses exercising on the track went with him giving him a good pace. Wicklight went the plate distance in 2:15. Mortlake and Cicely from the same stable worked three-quarters in 1:15 1/2. Chippewa from the Hendrie string, was sent six furlongs in 1:12. Peter Paul went a half in 52 seconds. Sear fell from the Hendrie string, was worked a mile to-day and did it handsly in 1:44.

The final trials of Inferno and Will King, the horses to finish first and second in the plate last year, were made on May 10, both horses made about the same time.

THE "OPEN SHOP."

U. S. FOUNDRYMEN DISCUSS IT IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, May 12.—Plans for establishing the "open shop" in the iron manufacturing industry in Chicago will be discussed to-day at a conference of the leading foundrymen of the country.
