Yesterday morning Patrick Geehan suffered the extreme penalty of the law for the mur-
der of Garrett Sears. The excution took place in the yard Westward of the Peniten-
tiary, in the presence of the High Sherif, his
deputy and a few members of the Teral hid deputy and a f few members of the Legal and
Medical Profession and of the Press. The Medical Profession and of the Press. The
tinfortunate man has enjoyed good sleep al-
most ever since his confinement, and has parmost ever since his confinement, and has par-
taken of his meals heartily; and on Surday taken of his meals heartily; and on Sunday
night, though he knew it to be his last night night, though he knew it on be his las usual,
upon this earth, he slept as soundly as usurn
and rose early yesterday morning apparently and rose early yesterday morning apparently
quite refreshed.
At an early hour he was visited by his ConAt an early hour he was visited by his Con-
fessor, Revd. Dr. Howley, and Rev. Mr.

seven oclock, when Mass was celebrated and seven o clock, when Mass was celebrated and
the prisoner partook of the Sacraments. Father McGrath entered the prison shortly after.

drooping his head, moved on with a slow and steady step to thesesaffold, up which heascend-
ed, and on to the drop, having been escorted ed, and on to the drop, having been escorted

sent followed, filling in the line of procession, sent followed, filling in the line of procession,
all with uncovered heads, in which state they
remained until some time after all was of remained until some time after all was over.
He was dressed in prison clothes, his face was He was dressed in prison clothes, his face was
a livid white, and his hair quite grey, which
had become so had become so since his condemineytion; but
his quiet demeanour, and marked docility, his quiet demeanour, and marked docility,
appeared to give expression that he was either perfectly resigned to his fate, or that he was

ing his doom. The signal was given to the executioner by the waving of a white hand-
