

DAILY PAPERS.—We learn from St. John's that there is to be a daily edition of the "Chronicle" published about the first of July; and Tuesday's "Ledger" says it is probable there will be another daily issued on or about the first of July. St. John's will then have three daily papers! Go ahead, gentlemen, we wish you all success.

A large quantity of lumber manufactured at the Ellershouse mills, Nova Scotia, has been shipped at Hantsport, via Windsor, N. S., for Bett's Cove. The "Swansea" has also a quantity of hay and machinery for Bett's Cove, and will, after arrival there, take a cargo of copper ore to Swansea, England.—'North Star.'

The schooner "Mary," Capt. Denief, arrived at St. John's from the Banks on Saturday last, to Messrs Job Brothers & Co., with equal to about 350 qtls. dry fish.

The "Frank," Jackman master, to Messrs. W. Grieve & Co., also arrived on Saturday morning. On Wednesday night the "Frank" lost one of her crew, a man named Francis Whittle, belonging to Placentia.

MISSING.—A man named Shields, who left this by the steamer 'Cortes' on her second last trip, for Halifax, and who had been at work at Bett's Cove mine has suddenly turned up missing. A few days after his arrival at Halifax Shields who is an American, accompanied by another American, who was left at Halifax by an American fishing schooner, some six weeks since, and who has been staying at Vibert's, started to see one of his companions staying at Richmond. They visited a house there where Shields' companion says he left him and returned to breakfast. Shields has not been seen since, and no trace of him can be found. A day or two since the 'companion' left the city for a sea port in the country to ship on a vessel. In addition to spare cash Shields had a cheque or draft with him for £30.

On yesterday, His Lordship the Chief Justice Hoyes paid a visit to the new Court House. He expressed himself highly pleased with the appearance of the interior and exterior of the building and of its surroundings.

The Schooner *Mollie Porter*, Captain Ireland, of Kinston, Maine, arrived on Sunday night, from the Bank fishery with 700 qtls. fish to Messrs. Duff & Palmer. This trip of fish has been landed, and proved to be of a very superior quality.

The *Blink Bonnie* Captain Tizzard that arrived here on Thursday last, from Twillingate, left Monday for St. John's.

The Schooner *Gem*, Captain Giles, with Light House stores for the northward, put in here on Tuesday with head wind; the *Gem* has on board the tower and apparatus for the Light House which is in course of erection at Cabot Island.

We regret being unable to advise any information on the fishery about this neighborhood or along the North Shore of the Bay since our last issue.

The vegetation which look so promising a fortnight ago has since been much retarded by the prevalence of north wind with cold weather.

The following is an extract of a letter dated, Battie Harbor, June 7th, 1879:—"It has been a beautiful winter here, no frost or snow worth while. The seals struck in late in April, the men made from four to five pounds each. The fish struck on the 24th of May. They jigged a quintal a man per day. The last two days fish has been scarce."

We observe that preparations are being made for the erection of a large two story building on a central site facing Harvey Street, a short distance to the west of LeMarchant Street. This erection when completed will be used as a school house for the education of the Roman Catholic youth of this community. It will, we are informed, be fitted out in a first-class manner with all the newest improvements.—H.G. Standard.

HALIFAX, June 16th.

Hanlan won the race to-day by six lengths.

Despatches say that Letellier will not be removed.

Houses were destroyed and trees demolished by a destructive storm in New York.

It is said that Sir J. McDonald will be made a member of the Judicial Committee of the British Privy Council, with a salary of £5,000. This will necessitate his retirement from the premiership of Canada and his residence in England.

By the bursting of a steamer's boiler at Koenigsburg, several persons were killed.

During a disorderly discussion in the French Chambers on Education Bill M. Cassagnac accused Jules Ferry with uttering calumnies against religious orders and falsifying documents. He refused to retract, and a vote of censure was passed amid great confusion.

The Italian rivers are still rising and awful destruction of property continues.

Sporting reporters say such performance as Hanlan's, was never before witnessed in British waters.

June 18th.

Receiver's office at Cherson, Russia, robbed of 1,500,000 rubles.

Shocks of earthquake attributed to Mount Etna; wrecked houses and killed several persons.

Bismarck strongly supported in Protective measures. Country expects a revival of prosperity.

Fall River, United States, spinner, to strike July 1. Fifteen thousand persons interested in the working of 30 mills.

Religious News.

His Lordship the Bishop of Harbor Grace, accompanied by the Rev. D. McInnes left on Monday last, in the Yacht *Lizette* for the Northward. His Lordship, during his visit, will give confirmation in the Northern part of his Diocese.

Several Clergymen, representing the Church of England and Methodist Church arrived at St. John's, on Saturday last, by the Steamer *Planer*, from the Northward.

The Methodist district meetings were held this week as follows:—Bonavista district on Monday, June 16th; Carbonar district on Tuesday, June 17th; St. John's district, Wednesday, June 18th.

The Conference opens in George's St. Church, St. John's, on Wednesday, June 25th, at 10 a. m.

On Sunday afternoon, Benediction and Procession of the Blessed Sacrament, was held in the Roman Catholic Cathedral, St. John's.

RELIGIOUS STATISTICS.—According to Hübner's "Statistical Tables of all the Countries of the earth," there are in the German Empire 25,600,000 Evangelical Christians, 14,900,000 Roman Catholics, 28,000 Orthodox Greek Christians, 512,000 Jews, 6000 of all other denominations or of none. In Austria-Hungary there are 23,900,000 Roman Catholics, 3,600,000 Evangelical Christians, 7,220,000 Greek and other Christians, 1,375,000 Jews, 5000 Mahomedans and others. In France there are 35,390,000 Roman Catholics, 600,000 Evangelical Christians, 118,000 Jews, 24,000 Mahomedans and others. In Great Britain and Ire and there are 25,000,000 Protestants of various denominations, 5,600,000 Roman Catholics, 250,000 Greeks &c., 26,000 Jews, 6000 Mahomedans and others. In Italy there are 26,960,000 Roman Catholics, 96,000 Evangelical Christians, 100,000 Greeks, &c., 36,000 Jews, 25 Mahomedans and others. In Spain there are 16,500,000 Roman Catholics, and 180,000 adherents of other denominations (details not given). In European Russia there are 56,108,000 Orthodox Greek Christians, &c.; 2,680,000 Evangelical Christians, 7,500,000 Roman Catholics, 2,700,000 Jews, and 2,600,000 Mahomedan and others. In Belgium there are 4,920,000 Roman Catholics, 13,000 Reformed Church, 20,000 Jews and 3000 belonging to other denominations. In the Netherlands there are 2,001,000 members of the Reformed Church, 1,235,000 Roman Catholics, 64,000 Jews, and 400 of other denominations. In Sweden and Norway there are 4,152,000 members of the Evangelical Church, 4000 Greeks and other Christians, and 2000 Jews; the number of Roman Catholics is not officially given—it is estimated at less than 1000.
