### The Veto Crisis.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The political crisis over the Veto Bill has undergone slight modification, as the Cabinet has decided to postpone the re-appearance of the bill before the House of Commons until August 7th. Present anticipations point to the hearing of the bill in the Unionist ranks. Landowine and his followers, who now favor the acceptance of the original bill, and the Halsburyites, who still want to fight it, will meet to-night at a complimentary dinner to be given to the late whip of the Unionist party, Sir Alex. A. Hood, now known as Lord Standish. At this dinner Mr. Dalton is expected to make a speech in an effort to pave the way for a modus vivendi between the opposing sections of the party. Both sides appear to be leaning in this direction. That the tension is lessened is shown by the fact that the King has decided to remain at Cowes for the rest of the week. There is still a strong belief in the lobby that Premier Asquith, in order to guard against surprises, will create a batch of fifty peers before again trusting the Veto Bill to the Lords.
