Income Tax is Working Well

Washington, Mar. 7.—The income
tax law bids fair to live up to the ex-
pectations of the Administration by
producing about \$50,000,000 annually
in revenue paid by close to 425,000 in-
dividuals.

Although treasury officials decided
last night not to make public for the
present the reports of internal revenue
collectors on the income tax, it be-
came known that more than 400,000
individuals had made returns in the
sixty-three collection districts, up to
Monday midnight, when the time limit
expired. From these individuals it
was understood the Government
would collect more than \$40,000,000.
It has been the opinion among of-
ficials that thousands of individuals
would take advantage of the thirty
days' extension of time granted in case
of absence and sickness, and they ex-
pect the final figures to show at least
25,000 more reporting. Including the
corporation tax as amended in the
present law, it was estimated that the
annual revenue from this source
would amount to about \$85,000,000.

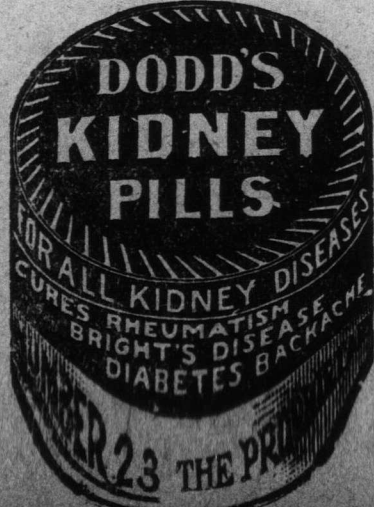
A business man who paid down

Graft Alleged at Montreal.

Mr. Beck Threatens to Make Disclo-
sures About Civic Affairs.

Montreal, March 12.—What the
Burns detectives found out at the
Montreal city hall about the same
time as they unearthed the graft at
Quebec, will be made public between
now and the municipal election day.
Mr. E. Beck, who wrote the sensa-
tional graft disclosures for the Mon-
treal Mail, will bring out a weekly
paper towards the end of next week,
and the first issue is expected to give
the details of alleged civic graft. Mr.
Beck will not be able to revive "The
Mirror" as the Herald and Telegraph
lay claim to this designation. To-
morrow the Herald and Telegraph
will add "and Mirror" to its name.
Mr. Beck is now in New York in con-
ference with the Burns detectives.
Mr. D. Lorne McGibbon is also there.
Mr. Beck's new paper will be called
"Beck's Weekly."



Father and Son Die Of Pneumonia

Friday last, Mr. E. Collishaw re-
ceived a message stating his nephew
W. A. Brine had died Thursday, of
pneumonia, and yesterday received
another message that the deceased's
father had died Monday night of the
same disease. The young Mr. Brine
was a bright lad of twenty years of

age, having graduated from Dal-
housie Technical School last fall and
entered into partnership with his
father, as A. A. Brine & Son, Crown
Land Surveyors for the Province of
Nova Scotia, with offices at Seabright.
Both had been away with a survey
party and returned home with colds
which developed into pneumonia and
both died within four days of each
other. Mr. Brine, sr., was a son of
the late Hon. William Brine, for
many years Provincial Cashier for
Nova Scotia. He is survived by a
wife and four children, also one
brother, the Rev. Charles Brine, of
Holyoke, Mass., and two sisters, Mrs.
(Rev.) Brown and Mrs. (Rev.)
Lowary.

The Tolls Debate

Senator Jones Assails President Wil-
son.

Special to the Evening Telegram.
WASHINGTON, To-day.

The returning skirmishing on the
Panama Canal tolls controversy will
occupy the Senate to-day, as a result
of the effort made yesterday by Sena-
tor Jones, of Washington, to have
passed his resolution calling upon the
President for information as to what
foreign Governments have protested
against the toll exemption of Ameri-
can coastwise ships and for corres-
pondence between United States and
foreign Powers relating thereto. In
urging the resolution, Jones charged
that the exemption repeal was the
price to be paid by the States for non-
interference in Mexico by foreign
Powers and that President Wilson's
plea to Congress for repeal followed
negotiations with Great Britain
whereby that action had agreed to
support the principles of the Monroe
Doctrine. The Senator assailed the
views of the President in the matter,
declaring that to reverse the policy
of the Government would be humili-
ating, cowardly and craven action.
Jones argued that repeal would be a
great economic blunder, that it would
benefit Canadian interests and trans-
continental roads and no others, and
injure more or less every other inter-
est in this country.

George Westinghouse the Inventor Is Dead.

He Revolutionized Railroadings with
His Invention of the Air Brake.

New York, March 12.—George West-
inghouse died suddenly here this
afternoon. He had been suffering
with a heart complaint for three
months.

Mr. Westinghouse was 68 years old,
and was perhaps best known as the
inventor of the Air Brake which bears
his name, and which revolutionized
railroading in this country. The air
brake which he invented is used
throughout the civilized world, and in
almost every part of the globe there
are great plants which he founded.

Mr. Westinghouse founded many
manufacturing companies in this
country, Canada and abroad, includ-
ing plants at Hamilton, Ontario; Man-
chester and London, England. In the
Westinghouse industries some fifty
thousand persons are employed, and
the many companies have a capitali-
zation aggregating \$200,000,000.

In August, 1867, he married Mar-
guerite Erskine Walker, who survives
him together with one child, George,
Jr., who lives near Lennox, Mass.
The son married Miss Violet Brockle-
bank, daughter of Sir Thomas and
Lady Brocklebank, Cumberland, Eng-
land.

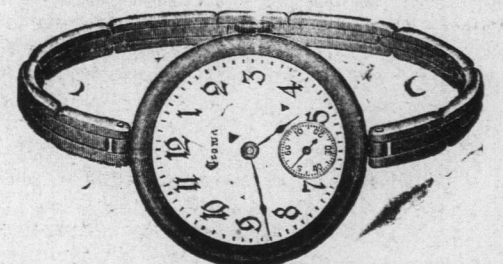
