It Challenges Hamburg

The great canal connecting Marseilles with the River Rhone, which is destined to make Marseilles the world's greatest port, was opened a few days ago. The canal connects London with the Mediterranean by an almost straight line, making Marseilles the greatest gateway to the east and rendering it the central clearing house for all north American trade.

Fifty miles long, it has taken fifteen years to build. Nearly five miles of the canal consists of a subterranean tunnel seventy-two feet wide, making it the widest tunnel in the world. The subterranean waterway is forty-five feet high. It was blasted out of the rocky North Mountains and is France's most wonderful engineering achievement.

The completion of the canal at this moment demonstrates the enormous resources that France is able to employ even at the height of the world's greatest war. It will enable Marseilles to expand industrially along the shores of the great canal and gulf known as L'Etang de Berry, which will now be studded with huge factories and warehouses. The plan is to make Marseilles a free port, which will give the final death blow to Hamburg. It is also planned to erect storehouses for goods proceeding through the Panama Canal, particularly oil.

The canal was officially opened recently by Minister of Commerce Etienne Clementel, Minister of Public Works Marcel Sembat, and Under Secretary for Subistence Joseph Thierry, amidst scenes of tremendous enthusiasm.

How Germans are Fooled.

A neutral who recently visited Berlin, says the thing that struck him most forcibly was the extent to which the Germans are being fooled by their rulers. "Do you know," said he, "the bulk of the people of Germany fondly believe that their big Transatlantic liners are still running regularly, and why should they not, considering that, to further the deceit, in the windows of the offices of the Hamburg-American and Norddeutscher Lloyd lines in the Unter den Linden the weekly sailings of their vessels are still announced! Everywhere, too, I found the belief prevailed that no ship had left England or entered one of her ports since the Lusitanian went down, and they can't understand for the life of them how England is holding out!"

Australian Navy Grows

Australia's navy is expanding. Recently the cruiser Brisbane was launched at Cockatoo Island, and it is notified that a new light cruiser is about to be laid down where the Brisbane was built. The cruiser will be named H.M.A.S. Adelaide. Australia is to undertake, as soon as possible, the building of submarines in its own shipyards. The Commonwealth Navy Office is calling for qualified persons desirous of proceeding to England to work in the Admiralty shipyards to learn the methods of reconstruction. They will take a two-year course, afterwards returning to begin the work of submarine construction for the Australian Navy.

Shortage of Food.

A Leading Article in Berlin Newspaper Openly Admits that the Supply of Necessary Articles is Inadequate.

London, May 26.—The Germans are at last admitting a shortage of food. A leading article in the Schlesiache Zeitung, the organ of the Great Silician land owners, says:

"It is childish to continue always to hide the truth. Let us openly admit that the difficulties that have arisen mainly in the great town are caused not merely by a lack of system in the distribution of the necessary articles of food, but also by the fact that the supply of such articles is inadequate."

The Journal admits that grievous discontent has spread in all directions in consequence of defects in the system of dealing with the food supply and hopes that the measures introduced in the new imperial food department will improve the situation.
