Lumbermen's Sports in Scotland.

Newfoundlanders Among the Prize Winners.

The most notable event of the past week was the Lumberman's Sports, which took place at Stanley, on Saturday, Oct. 20th. It was under the auspices of the Stanley War Relief Funds Committee, whose funds were augmented by some \$300. The occasion was observed by us as a half-holiday, and quite a number of our men went thither by rail.

Many notables from various parts of Scotland were present to witness the unique aquatic and other sports put on by members of the Canadian and Newfoundland Forestry Companies. Amongst them were the Duke and Duchess of Atholl, Colonel and Mrs. Fotheringham, of Muriel Castle; Madame Tempest, Commandant of Dalguise V. A. D. Auxiliary Hospital, Wm. Cox, Managing Director of Highland Railway; Sir J. S. Maxwell, timber controller for Scottish District; Lady Maxwell, Sir Joseph Outerbridge, Lt. and Mrs. Herbert Outerbridge and Mrs. Campbell.

A band from the Scotch Horse was in attendance, and rendered some very interesting overtures during the afternoon. The event was under the direction of Capt. McLaren, officer commanding Canadian Forestry Corps, and Lt. H. Cole, of the Nfld. Forestry Companies. The Duke of Atholl, Sir J. S. Maxwell, Major Ferguson (of Canadian Corps), and Major Sullivan were judges of the various contests.

Be it said to the credit of our tug of war team, they maintained the reputation gained on September 1st as being the champion team of the district. The Canadian team, made up of big husky chaps from the Western Provinces, one of them weighing over 15 stone, boasted of what they were going to do. Yet our lads had a clean walk over with them every time. When our team got up against a team of Scotchmen, selected from within a radius of forty miles, the tussle waged long and furious. In the final heat they were thirty-three minutes on the rope, struggling with might and main, while the excited spectators kept vociferously cheering our men. Eventually our team got the brawny Scots across the line, both sides having scored a point; and thus the prize of sixty shillings was equally divided amongst them.

Our tug of war team consisted of L. K. Goodyear (a jolly good sort of anchor man), Sergt. E. Moore, Corporal J. A. Campbell, Lt. Corporal

J. Langdon, Privates E. Hult, C. King, J. Olfred and H. Stockley. There were a number of entries for the log sawing and log chopping contests, which displayed the marvellous skill and rapidity with which the lumbermen use the axe and the saw. The prize for sawing went to the Canadians, but the chopping prize was donated Sergt. Ball.

The log race on the pond was an interesting event, two Canadians and two Newfoundlanders entering therefor. Each man occupied a single log, and their object was for each man to propel a log with a pike pole from one end of the pond to the other, the person doing it in the quickest time was to receive a prize of £1. This honour fell to Sergt. W. Beaton of Ours.

The log rolling exhibition, which took place in the water, was an intensely exciting sport, the Canadians acquitting themselves creditably, which elicited rounds of applause from the large gathering. Some remarkable feats of skill, daring and agility were performed by these lumberjacks, who appeared to be as much at home on a whirling, twirling single log as Capt. Kean would be on the good ship "Prospero."

Stanley is only fifteen miles from the nearest station to our Camp, and the return ticket cost each man but thirty-six cents. We left here at 1 p.m. and returned at 9.30. The Canadians have finished operations there, and are about to move to a new scene of labour nearer Perth.

Major Sullivan was highly complimented by quite a number of people over the smart appearance and good behaviour of our men whilst on their vacation last Saturday; it was the first time some of them had seen any of the lads from the Tenth Island.

Sir Joseph Outerbridge visited our Camp last week. He expressed himself as being greatly charmed with the country, and said the two days spent here were the pleasantest of any spent on this side the "herring pond." A visit was paid A. B. Companies, where he inspected the operations of the men, congratulating the officers upon the success already attained. He was accompanied by Lt. Herbert Outerbridge and Mrs. Outerbridge.

The new draft of 45 men arrived safely on the 17th, and the men are now established among us, performing the same tricks as all the other men are doing.

There was a cessation of hostilities between our men and the trees from Oct. 8 to 18th, to enable our forces to remove the dead "bodies," which in their thousands strewed the hillsides. But now they have again renewed the engagement. Every day the battle rages long and furious, and at evening the Camp is astir with tales of the thousands of giants slain with axes and saws.

The construction of our log chute has been improved upon by the addition of an inclined curve at the lower end, and the construction of another chute which leads off from the main in the shape of a broken Y. This was done in order to check the speed of the logs, which go thundering down the long chute with lightning rapidity. Now they come to a halt at the top of the inclined curve, and, reversing into the short chute, are carried down to the jack-ladder at the mill.

The new building for the second mill is about ready for the installation of the machinery which has already arrived. With this mill in operation it is expected to turn out daily a cut of 10,000 ft. of lumber. It was estimated that some 7,000,000 ft. of

lumber was on this section when we came here. By felling a million feet per month, it will take to the end of February before it is all down, and with the mills each cutting 500,000 ft. per month, sawing operations would not be completed before next June. So you see there is every probability of our lads spending a "white" at home while you, the Bonnie folk of this part of Scotland, are away.






