COLD-BLOODED MURDER.

LONDON, July 5. (Via Reuters Agency.)—Reuters Ltd., is authoritatively informed that the outrage on the Lindover Castle which is the fourth hospital ship torpedoed this year, was deliberate and premeditated following upon orders given the submarine commander by the superior German authority, which alleged the presence of eight flying officers. The allegation is foundationless and could easily have been tested by the right of search. There is no doubt but that the submarine endeavored to slaughter all witnesses of the crime, according to Count Luxburg's famous pledge (spurious verily). It is clear that the German high command has a settled plan to destroy hospital ships as far as possible.

HONORING THE BRAVE.

TORONTO, To-day. All the male pupils of high and public schools of Toronto will be instructed to salute all returned and crippled soldiers, whether in uniform or not, when meeting them in public places. Such was decided last night at a meeting of the Board of Education. The motion carried unanimously.

AMERICAN ACTIVITY.

WASHINGTON, To-day. General Pershing reported to-day on American front patrol activity in Chateau Thierry region yesterday, and announced that American troops were still engaged with their Fourth of July offensive which resulted in the capture of Hamel. In the course of the successful patrols in Picardy and in Chateau Thierry region, we captured prisoners. In Picardy a machine gun was taken. Hostile planes, which approached our lines near Vaux, and in the Vosges, were driven back by our fire. Our troops co-operated with the British in their attack made to-day.

ARTILLERY FIGHTING.

PARIS (Official). To-day. There was no activity in the opposing artillery during the day. The firing was quite heavy south of the Aisne River, in the regions of Cutry and Mont Gobert, west of Buzareille. Northwest of Chateau Thierry we carried out a surprise attack and captured prisoners.

THE WAR IN THE EAST.

Eastern Theatre.—Along the Doiran front, and in the Monastir sector there was considerable activity during the day. Our artillery directed a destructive fire upon the enemy batteries in both these sectors. Two enemy machines were shot down by our aerial defence.

TRANSPORT TORPEDOED.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The American army transport Covington, homeward bound after landing many thousand soldiers in France, was torpedoed and sunk in the war zone on Monday night. Six of the crew are missing but all the men with the ship's officers have been landed at a French port. No army

Hard Coal Problem.

We learn that tonnage to bring anthracite coal to St. John's has been secured, and the permits from the United States Control Board have been received by our agents in New York. A new and serious development has arisen, however, for it is now found impossible to secure the coal, owing to a labor shortage in the States caused by the war. It is hoped that later in the season the supply will be available.

Flour Prices May Drop

It is quite possible to anticipate the lowering of flour prices, as the United States and Canadian crop will, this year, be something like 10,000,000 bushels more than last, and fully 30 p.c. more than any during the past 3 or 40 years. A Water Street business man informs us that because of this fact, it would not be unreasonable to expect the long desired decline in prices.
