GETTING THEM OUT.

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 17. Lack of ships, space and the high cost of transportation may necessitate the assignment of a special steamer to deport 3600 undesirable aliens held in this country. Anthony Caminetti, Commissioner General of Immigration testified to-day before the House Immigration Committee.

SENATE WANTS COPY.

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 17. Without record, vote or debate, the Senate to-day adopted a resolution by Senator Borah, Republican, asking the President to send to Senate "if not incompatible with public interest, a copy of the protest said to have been made by some members of the Peace Committee against the Shantung provision in the Peace Treaty."

NO SOLUTION.

PARIS, July 17. The measures announced Wednesday by the Government are not likely to settle the problem of the high cost of living, according to a statement issued by the executive committee of the General Labor Federation, after a meeting last night. The committee announced last night that the announced meeting would be held to-day to discuss final plans for the general strike proposed for Monday.

DECLINE IN EXCHANGE.

NEW YORK, July 17. Exchange on London underwent another violent decline to-day, demand bills falling to 4.26% and cables 4.28%, or three or four cents under yesterday's figures, being the lowest ever recorded.

Empress of Britain Arrives.

The C. P. O. S. Liner Empress of Britain, four days from Quebec, arrived in port this morning and will take on board about 600 passengers of the Grampian. The ship is now anchored in the stream and waiting for arrangements to be made for the transfer of the passengers, which will be done by tugs. The Empress of Britain is a sister ship of the Empress of Ireland, which was rammed and sunk by the Norwegian ore steamer Storstad in the Gulf of St. Lawrence some years ago, a great loss of life ensuing.

C. of E. Educational Campaign.

A meeting was held this morning of the Divisional Commanders and Captains of the men of the organizations, at which progress was reported in the work of building up the teams. The report showed that the work done to date is more than satisfactory and well ahead of the schedule, and it is certain that the work of organization will be completed in every detail some time before the drive begins.

We are now able to publish in more concrete and definite form the objects aimed at by the Campaign, though their working out necessarily remains to be done later. These objects may be summed up as follows: 1.—The Church of England College. To provide more suitable College Buildings, including Boarding Houses, for Boys and Girls.

To have accommodation in those Boarding Houses for at least 150 pupils. To have a technical Department in conjunction with the colleges that will be wholly up-to-date in its curriculum and methods and which will include Commercial Education and Domestic Science among its principal features.

2.—College Staff.

To provide our College with a properly equipped staff of teachers.

3.—Training of Teachers.

To make provision for a more efficient training of teachers.

4.—Scholarships.

To encourage the establishment of Scholarships in order to promote the higher education of deserving pupils.

5.—Elementary Education.

To utilize the existing buildings of the College, so far as they are suitable, to meet the needs of Elementary Education.

To assist, as far as possible, in providing additional accommodation for the five hundred children for whom we have reason to believe, there is no school capacity at present.

Martinsyde Biplane Crashes.

AS SHE BEGINS TRANSATLANTIC FLIGHT.

For the second time the Martinsyde biplane has crashed, the latest accident occurring yesterday afternoon at 3.15. With a fresh S.W. breeze blowing, the little aeroplane skimmed along the ground for about 100 feet, then taking the air. She had reached an altitude of about 30 feet and was about 100 feet from the spot where she had taken off when a quick gust of wind struck and almost turned her bottom up. Raynham, the pilot, almost immediately shut off the power, and the machine, not having sufficient momentum to withstand the wind, crashed to the ground headed toward the lake.

From this she was twisted about ten feet ahead, the force of the first crash shaking the engine almost out of position, smashing the undercarriage and crumpling the wing. The few spectators that had seen the take off now rushed in, while the mechanics, who had run for fire extinguishers ran forward to be ready if the machine should take fire. Neither Raynham nor Biddlecombe, the navigator, was injured, both climbing out as soon as she was still. Surveying the wreckage with a rueful smile, Raynham remarked that he "knew of nothing that they could do but put a match to it!" It is undoubtedly a severe disappointment for him, having been the second to arrive in Newfoundland and being here ever since while machine after machine arrived and got away. He is now awaiting word from his firm, and it will rest entirely with the answer what he will do. Yesterday's Meteorological conditions were good, and with the favorable wind blowing across the Atlantic he would have made a speed of about 140 miles. In this way he would have cut down Alcock and Brown's speed by a couple of hours. The sympathy of all goes to Raynham and his confere in their hard luck.

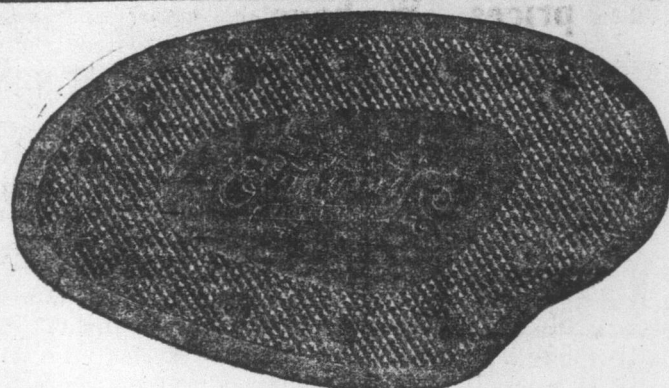
