Orphans Feted on "Briton."

Boys and Girls of C. of E. Orphanage Entertained on Board H. M. Train Ingleby Briton by Commander Fenn and Sailor Boys—Children of Other Orphanages to Receive Similar Treat—Commander Fenn's Generosity Greatly Appreciated.

Through the laudable generosity of Commander Fenn, of H.M. Training ship Briton, the young boys and girls of the Church of England Orphanage were entertained on board the old ship yesterday afternoon, and enjoyed themselves in a manner that will preclude their ever forgetting the event as long as all of them live.

Being driven to the ship by motor bus, the little ones were met, at the door, (over which a sign of welcome had been painted) by the officers and men of the station, and immediately began to enjoy themselves without let or hindrance. The sailor boys went out of their way in their endeavours to make the children happy, and soon there sprang up an impromptu friendship between the men and the children, and they could be seen going round the enclosed ship arm in arm.

Many means of amusement had been arranged beforehand, and the orphans could have long runs on a suspended cable, to which was attached a chair, hung on a wheel which, when pushed, sent the chair and occupant spinning through the air to the other end, a distance of about eighty feet or more. There was a boxing match between the children, a ring having been put up, while many other side-shows were in evidence. Grabs for coins that were in the water charged with electricity could be made, and there was always a crowd around the pan of water. Music was supplied by a big Victrola. After tea, which came at five o'clock, a tug of war between the boys and girls was contested, the girls winning after a very strenuous struggle.

In which the sailors cheered (and sometimes gave the rope a sly haul) for the girls. The crowning act of the day was a ventriloquistic display by Mr. Joseph Wheeler, of Reid's Electrical Dept., which kept all in roars of laughter. During the afternoon Lady Harris came aboard for a short while and was shown through the ship by the Commander.

It is the intention of Commander Fenn to extend the same treat to the children of the other orphanages and the practice will likely run through the winter. Nobody is more grateful to him and his officers than the children, who will remember them always with pleasant memories.

The Commander of the Briton has proven himself, in the short time he has been here, to be the most popular one aboard the Briton, and sailors and officers alike hold him in much esteem.

The Relief of Lucknow.

Perhaps one of the darkest pages in the history of the British Empire is contributed by the Indian Mutiny when our greatest and wealthiest possession was torn asunder by a huge revolt which was only quelled after desperate fighting and considerable bloodshed. It was not so much the

life amongst our soldiers that makes the Mutiny such a sorrowful episode, for constant fighting in every corner of the globe has, more or less, inured us to heavy casualties, but it is the awful atrocities perpetrated by the savage mutineers on defenceless men and women and children that remains indelibly fixed in our memory.

From the beginning of May, 1857, when the smouldering fires of rebellion burst into flame, the whole mutiny is one long, sad story of murder, rapine and treachery—officers shot in the back by their Sepoys on parade, civilians foully murdered in cold blood, and defenceless women and children outraged and butchered by men whom hatred had turned into wild beasts. What wonder, therefore, that the British soldiers, rendered furious by these atrocities, fought with a desperation never before or since equalled in any campaign. They had seen the corpses of women and children lying mutilated in the blazing sun mutely calling for vengeance, and it was with a feeling of revenge in their hearts that the white troops proceeded to quell the mutiny. Many of the officers and men had lost all they cared for in this world—their wives and infants—having been cruelly slaughtered—and these men fought as only fanatics fight. They were only too glad to throw away their lives on the battlefield provided they could account for one or more of the murderers before they died. In every town and station where there was troops, desperate fighting took place. At Cawnpore the English were hopelessly outnumbered, and were forced to capitulate to the notorious Nana Sahib, who having given his word that all lives would be spared treacherously slaughtered the women and children. To the lasting glory of the British officer and soldier, never was their bravery, coolness, and resource more magnificently displayed than during these terrible times, fighting against overwhelming odds, and holding out until relief came. After months of fighting the help so much needed came at last, and the British marched in great numbers on Lucknow, on September 25, 1857, and with the relief of Lucknow the terrible mutiny was quelled.
