Obituary.

MR. JOHN J. ASPELL.

(H. F. Shortis.)
During the great American Civil War in the early sixties, it is estimated that not less than two thousand Newfoundlanders enlisted in the Federal Navy of the United States. Without exception they were conspicuous for their daring, hardihood and agility, and many of them rose to high and responsible positions in the service. This is not to be wondered at, as they received their training in that great nursery of the Newfoundland sailors—the seafishery—and the increased time of our country, which qualified them to be, what they were always recognized—the most expert and capable mariners to be found in any country in the world. Their services were eagerly sought after by the Governments of many countries, and they were found in the Navies of Great Britain, Brazil, Chili, Peru and even far-off Japan. But it was in the Navy of the United States that the very large majority of them were to be found, and amongst them, both in the Army and Navy, was the subject of this brief sketch, John J. Aspell.

A few days ago, Mr. Wm. Aspell, of this city, received a notification announcing the death of his brother, which occurred at the National Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, Chelsea, Mass., U.S.A. August 17th, at the age of 82 years. The veteran served through the Civil War in both the Navy and Army, and, owing to his great bravery, daring and ability, was the recipient of many medals and honors, gained in many a hard fought battle on land and sea. Some years ago he received a substantial pension, and resided at the above institution. The deceased was another of those hardy, daring and heroic Newfoundlanders, who upheld the honor of their country wherever they were placed, and they were always to be found worthy of that encomium applied to our imperial regiment during the Great World War, as being "Better than the Best." The love of adventure is in their blood, and their loyalty to their country and their country or their adopted country has always been recognized by the authorities, both in the Army and Navy.

The deceased was the eldest brother of Mr. William Aspell, who spent so many years as Sacristan of the Roman Catholic Cathedral of this city, and who is still amongst us; and of Miss Aspell and Mrs. P. Lacey. He also leaves a nephew, Mr. Sylvester P. Murphy, of Brooklyn, New York, and a niece, Mrs. V. Cragg, Concord, New Hampshire, U.S.A.
