### AN UNIQUE VALEDICTORY.

What One Bank President Wrote to His Depositors.

(From Boston News Bureau, Aug. 7.)  
Boston—Two upstate New York banking institutions recently consolidated. The president of one of them, long in the service, notified his depositors that he was about to step down and that new interests would henceforth be in control. He concluded the letter to his depositors with the following unusual valedictory: "As we close our official relations with you may we say, in the words of a little old French Canadian trapper up in the Saskatchewan country when bidding farewell to some friends: 'May you always have a safe tent and no sickness as you journey. May you always have a cache for your provisions and provisions for your cache. May you never find a tree that will not yield her sap, or a field that will not grow grain. May your bees never freeze in winter. May their honey be rich and heavy, and may the comb crush in your teeth like the snow of your youth. May you have hearts like the morning, and may you come slow to the four-corners where man says 'Good Night.'"

### STUDEBAKER.

President Erskine Explains Cause for Increased Profits in Second Quarter. (Boston News Bureau, Aug. 7.)  
N.Y.—In response to an inquiry Pres. Erskine of Studebaker Corporation said: "Our net profits for the second quarter this year were greater than those of the first, because costs were less. There was no other reason, such as changed accounting method, increase of parts sales, or sales of more high-priced models. For the second quarter of the year Studebaker on sales of 28,132 cars reported net earnings of \$4,008,919, against \$3,842,259 on sales of 29,435 cars in the first quarter. In other words, while sales of cars declined 1233 profits increased \$487,751.

"The corporation during the past 12 months has increased its plant investment by nearly \$9,000,000. Larger part of increase past year represents expenditure for new facilities designed to add to plant efficiency and bring costs down."

### COPPER FIRMS UP AGAIN.

Price Back to 18 1/2 @ 19; Foreign Advances Most Optimistic.  
Boston—A well defined improvement both in the tone of the market and in the demand for copper has set in. Renewed interest is manifest among buyers and has culminated in moderate transactions for both domestic and export account up to 13 1/2 cents delivered basis.

Export demand has also increased on strong cable advices from abroad.

### An Artistic Display

In the West End window of James Baird, Ltd., there is now a very beautiful and artistic display which has been attracting considerable attention during the past few days. ### Salted Babies

Salt plays a curious part in christening ceremonies in some countries. The Armenians cover a new-born infant's skin with finely powdered salt. After being left on for three hours, the salt is washed off with warm water. A mountain tribe of Asia's Minor leaves the baby covered in this way for twenty-four hours.

The Greeks sprinkle their babies with salt at the christening, a custom that also marks the naming of children in some parts of Germany.

In countries where this custom persists it is believed that the practice endows a child with health and strength, and that it also wards off evil influences.

### Worms Have Memories

It was shown by a recent experiment that the earthworm has memory and can be trained.

Worms were introduced into a passage shaped like a letter T, and covered with a glass plate so that the movements of the little creatures might be observed. When they came to the junction about half the number turned one way and the other half the other way.

Then the apparatus was arranged so that the worms that took the left-hand passage received a mild but presumably disagreeable electric shock. At first the worms did not know what to make of this, but after they had been through the experience about two hundred times, they nearly all took the right-hand turn.

When the electrodes were then moved to the right-hand passage the worms learned to shift to the other passage after only thirty-five trials, evidently showing something more than the operation of chance.

Earthworms have no brain in the human sense; their nervous systems consist of a series of little ganglions, or nerve centres, connected with each other by nerve fibres.

### Double Dyeing

Several years ago there was developed a process for dyeing in two colours—in patterns—with a single dipping.

This apparent contradiction is resolved into common sense when it is explained that the fabrics for treatment were woven in silk, and cotton materials, dyes being used which would "take" on cotton but not silk, and vice versa.

The goods being dipped in a mixture of two such dyes, one would colour the cotton, and one the silk, and the desired effect would be obtained.

It is now possible to use the double dye process for a very wide range of effects, instead of being limited to about six simple colours. There are now about 700 methods, and the process is regarded as of prime importance to the weaving and hosiery industries of Britain.
