This firm also exhibit a two horse pleasure sleigh, which gets the 1st prize, and is somewhat new in design, being on the dog-cart principle, and will doubtless prove very convenient to those requiring a sleigh of this description. Robt. Barber exhibits a child's carriage, which is a perfect little gem in its way, and obtained the 1st prize; although the only one exhibited.

HARNESS, &c.
J. A. Tovell, Guelph, exhibits team harness, silver mounted, and well got up, and looks well to obtain the 1st prize. Alex. Gerrie, Fergus, exhibits in the same class, also an excellent set. Philip and Robertson, Hamilton, show a splendid set of double carriage harness, single do.; both silver mounted, also an excellent quilted gentlemen's saddle, and plain stuffed do. Thos. Hewson, Norval, exhibits 2 sets single carriage harness of good workmanship and finish, as also does Henry Gerth, New Hamburg, one set of single do., russet color, interspersed with black. We must not omit to mention a fine collection of carriage wheels, unpainted, exhibited by J. H. Downing, Alma, and which is awarded the 1st prize.

CARRIAGE SPRINGS.
Messrs. J. B. Armstrong & Co., Guelph, exhibit their famous new patented single leaf cast steel springs, which deservedly are awarded the first prize. The springs are submitted to an immense test leverage in the presence of the spectators, who cannot fail to be convinced after what they witness at one of these trials, that these springs undoubtedly possess all the qualities of elasticity, strength and durability claimed for them by the patentees.

CHEMICALS.
J. Anderson, Galt, exhibits specimens of compound machine oil, and West Virginia oil, both for lubricating purposes; also hard oils. He also shows specimens of different vinegars, manufactured by Williamson & Co., Hamilton.

The Wellington Oil Company exhibit a collection of lubricating, wool paint, and West Virginia oils; also a large vat of pure refined petroleum. They also exhibit some very curious specimens of cake from petroleum, which assume all sorts of fantastic shapes; one specimen resembling a large mass of horse hair.

James Authors, Toronto, exhibits a case of artificial limbs and trusses, which attracts much attention, from the exceeding beauty of the workmanship.

Welding & Belding, Brantford, exhibit an assortment of stoneware, which carries off the prize.

O. F. Shafer, Guelph, exhibits a surgical truss as an extra-give a prize therefor, also a very neat model of a land roller, which has the peculiarity of a small roller attached behind the larger one to cover any deficiency that may occur.

T. J. Day, Guelph, makes a large display of a variety of fancy articles, nicely bound books, wall paper, pictures, &c., carry off the 1st prize in bookbinding, letter press assortment; and 1st prize in pocket books, wallets, &c.; also 1st prize in bookbinding, blank book assortment.

PRINTING.
James Innes, Guelph, Mercury, exhibits in fancy printing, taking first prize; do. in Letter Press printing, 2nd prize in ornamental posters, and 1st in plain posters. John Cameron & Co., London Advertiser, took the 1st prize in fancy posters, prominent in the exhibits of the first being the handsomely got up Western fair poster. Jos. H. Hacking, Guelph Advertiser, carries off 2nd prize in the Letter-Press printing class.

LEATHER, ETC.
Some splendid specimens of leather are exhibited by Dr. Wm. Pipe, of Berlin, and W. C. Wortley, Drayton.

W. D. Hepburn & Co., Guelph, are the only exhibitors of boots and shoes, and the specimens shown are as usual highly creditable to those well-known manufacturers.

J. Gladstone, Salem, exhibits a case of assorted shoemakers' pegs, also an excellent assortment of shoemakers' lasts and trees.

J. Strohe exhibits 2 sides excellent slaughter sole leather.

KNITTING MACHINES.
Mrs. Hartley exhibits Lamb's Knitting Machine, and is surrounded by a crowd of spectators, watching the various operations in the process of knitting the various articles.

SEWING MACHINES.
The Appleton Co., of Hamilton, have a full display of the various machines manufactured by this company. Among them we notice the sewing machine worked by steam attachment, deservedly claimed to be one of the greatest novelties of the Exhibition, and a fac simile of the one purchased by Lady Dufferin and Lady Harriet Flecker, at Hamilton.

POLTRY.
This Wednesday morning, we had the pleasure of personally examining the poultry on exhibition, and were struck with the immense display, the beauty and variety of the birds, and the admirable arrangements for their safe-keeping. One could scarcely hear their crows on account of the continued crowing kept up by the male birds, from the deep bass of the Cochins to the shrill voice of the Bantam.

Mr W. Laing, Nassagaweya, shows a fine pair of Pea hens, with their young; and Mr John F. Ridd, Puslinch, also exhibits in this class. Mr Geo. Hood, Guelph, exhibits a pair of light brahma pootras, and a pair of guinea fow. Mr John S. Armstrong shows a pair of light brahma pootras, which are exceedingly handsome, and were much admired. Mr Wm Tolton, Eramosa, also shows a handsome pair of chickens in this class, as also does Mr W. J. Ridd, of Arkell. Mr W. T. Tolton exhibits a much admired pair of brahma chickens, as also Mr Chas Davidson, of Guelph. Mr F. Sturdy, Guelph, is a large exhibitor of very fine rowan ducks, and brahmas. Mr J. Forsyth, Toronto, has the largest lot of fowl on exhibition. This stock, which includes brahmas, cochins, spanish chickens, two pair of buff cochins, ducks, two pair of imported partridge, and a fine collection of imported fowls. Mr James Main, Trafalgar, shows two pair of handsomely colored dorkings, and a large pair of white geese. Mr F. Sturdy, Guelph, exhibits a pair of fine cochins, a pair of spanish fowl, a brace of Aylesbury ducks, and a pair of imported dark brahmas. Mr H. M. Thomas, of Brooklin, is another large exhibitor, he shows he shows a fine pair of Brahma chickens, colored Dorkings, Cochins, either variety, Polands, Spanish chickens, two pair of white Cochins, pair of imported partridge pair white brahma pootras and a dark pair, a nice pair of bondans and a pair of Spanish fowls. Mr. H. Young of Guelph, shows a pair of Cochins, pair of white Dorkings and white Cochins Chinas.
